San Francisco, May 14.—An El Paso, Texas, dispatch of last night, which states that the Mexicans are making a brilliant success of their operations. From Janos, 150 miles southwest of here, in Chihuahua, the Mexican point from which military news must come, army officers have been unable to obtain any decisive intelligence. Crook was expected there nearly a week ago. It is now known that he has undertaken to penetrate the heart of the mountains directly southwest. Janos is a military station and is so related to the mountains that he can see them all from his post or pass near by.

The Indian Question. SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.—A Hermsillo (Mexico) special this evening says that General Topiz, commanding the troops in Sonora, thinks Crook will encounter the Apaches readily in the stronghold of the Sierra Madre. The Apaches, he thinks, could never be settled while they are in the hands of the reservation, being too close to renegades. Sonora people think the Indian Agency encourages Indians to leave the reservation and to deprive and steal in Sonora, carrying back plunder to the reservation to exchange for arms and ammunition. The removal of the reservation is the only solution to the difficulty. He has confidence in Crook's ability to conquer the renegades, and hopes the United States Government will appreciate the difficulties and hardships he is now encountering.

After the Storm. ST. LOUIS, May 15.—The destruction by the cyclone at St. Louis, on Sunday night, seems to have been much greater in the country than in the city. The latest advices from the country for 15 miles southwest from Macon the storm has levelled everything in its track, farm houses and in most cases all buildings. A meeting was held at Macon last night to consider the condition of the sufferers and devise means to aid those needing help. Very little damage seems to have been done east of the city. Very few reports are yet received.

Fire's Freaks—A Chance for Phil. THOMPSON. HARRISBURG, Ky., May 15.—About midnight last night a fire started in the principal business house in town. The fire new Presbyterian Church was destroyed together with thirty other buildings. The fire was useless for what of water, but the citizens were able to contain it. The fire was caused by Phil. Thompson, who is on trial for murder, was among the best workers at the fire. His jury looked on him with a charge of a deputy sheriff. At last account the fire is still in progress. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.

A Whisking Accident. JERSEY CITY, N. J., May 15.—The wife of the Rev. E. L. Stoddard, rector of St. John's Episcopal church in this city, was shot and killed at her home, 90 Summit avenue. Mrs. Stoddard was dining at the table in the kitchen. She struck the weapon off the trigger, the shell exploded, the ball striking her in the side, passed through her skull and lodged in the brain. She died in a few minutes.

An Old Story. GALETTER, May 15.—Major Wasson, the defaulting army paymaster, denies that his shortage is due to gambling. He alleges that he was forced to pay an amount to the Government for sixty days to help his father during a temporary embarrassment, intending to reimburse the amount. It is understood he will make no defense.

A Sensible Frenchman. NEW YORK, May 15.—Henry Greenway, French Commissioner of Agriculture to the United States, here for two years, sails for home on Wednesday next. He prophesied that the wine of California will be a success. He thinks we cheat ourselves by using foreign labels on our good wines.

Particulars of an Infamous Crime. LONDON, May 15.—The Times says: The particulars of the attempt to destroy the steamer plying between Liverpool and New York have just leaked out at the former place. It appears that just before the vessel left Liverpool for New York, on her last voyage, having on board a number of immigrants, a man gave the steward a box and requested him to carry it to New York. The steward's suspicions were aroused and he consulted the Captain, who ordered the box opened. This was done in the presence of the Captain and officers, and the box found to contain an infernal machine. The contents of the box were thrown overboard, but the box itself retained a note made of the address upon it. The fact of this discovery was not made known publicly in New York on the vessel's arrival there, but the British Consul-General in that city was notified. The steamer has just returned to Mersey from New York.

Irish Bishops Rebuked. ROME, May 15.—The document sent by the Vatican to the Bishops of Ireland, referring to the fund being raised for Parnell, says it is intolerable that priests, much more Bishops, should promote such an object. It condemns all collections which may be employed for exciting rebellion against the laws.
