San Francisco News Notes. SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—C. H. Street, the Secretary of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, during a recent trip to the south, discovered land frauds midway between San Luis Obispo and Monterey.

Wonderful Petrification.

For some years past there has been a bank in Lake Tahoe, which in clear weather has been seen by many from the mountains. It has at the right of the steamer's course between Tahoe City and the Tallac House about two miles beyond Idyllwild. It looked as if a lot of trees had sunk to the bottom of the lake, and that moss and slime had collected there until the whole presented a warty, semi-transparent appearance about fifty feet below the surface.
