
THE AIM

Gordova B. Witherspoon Has a Stroke of Bad Luck and Attempts Suicide at Slottersbeck's Gun Store

Yesterday morning, about half-past 8 o'clock, a stranger walked into the gun and ammunition store of H. Slottersbeck, and wanted to look at a pistol.

Communication of Mrs. Geo. Turner calling attention to water main broken in grading Banker Hill avenue. On motion, the Clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Beaudry to repair the pipe.

Council Proceedings.

Council met in regular session last evening, President Moran in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Auditor presented his usual report, showing the condition of the various funds in the City Treasury. Referred to the Finance Committee.

The City Assessor reported the collection of \$823.08 personal property tax since last report, and presented Treasurer's receipts for same, less commissions. Referred to Finance Committee.

Ordinance granting franchise for street railroad to the East Los Angeles and Main Street Railroad Company. Adopted.

Ordinal bond of E. H. Boyd, Street Superintendent. Approved.

Health Officer's Report. Health Officer Gale reported 22 deaths for the month of May, as follows: Consumption, 10; suicide, 1; cancer, 1; accidental, 1; enlargement of liver, 1; apoplexy, 1; meningitis, 1; typhoid fever, 1; gunshot wound, 1; cholera infantum, 2; erysipelas, 1; anemia, 1; fever, 1; diphtheria, 2; general debility, 1; spasms, 1; marasmus, 1; tubercular meningitis, 1; whooping cough, 1; enteritis, 2; Malin, 23; females, 9.

During same period there were 21 births, 14 males, 7 females. Report filed.
