As Well as on a Fishing Excursion.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Although there are very contradictory reports as to the President's purpose, there is no possible doubt that he will make a visit to the Yellowstone. Secretary Lincoln will spend August in the Yellowstone country with the President. There is every prospect that the entire administration will be absent from Washington during August, and the government will be run by the Assistant Secretaries. The anxiety of the President at being absent for so long a time from telegraphic communication has been relieved by an arrangement which will furnish a daily line of couriers from wherever the Presidential party goes to the nearest telegraph station. The President will be in daily communication with the executive office as well as he could be on a fishing excursion.

Fugitive Pleas.

CLEVELAND, O., July 16.—A bloody melee occurred about 3 o'clock today near this city at a picnic resort known as the Williams House, and situated on the Becksville road, four miles from Newburg. Five hundred men and women, mostly Newburg mill hands and their wives, of all nationalities, but principally Irish, Polish and Bohemian, had gone out to spend the afternoon. A fight arose, from what cause is not known, about six o'clock and speedily assumed bloody proportions. Eye witnesses say that fully two hundred of the men and women took part in it, and knives, chairs, benches, plates, improvised clubs, beer glasses and bricks were the weapons used. The police got word half an hour later and a squad of men were sent to the scene. The fight was over but the place was a wreck, the fence torn down, windows broken, blood everywhere, and some fifty persons injured, some being taken to the hospital in a bad condition. Most of the wounded were able to get home.

The Telegrapher's Strike.

DeLesseps' Plans.

LONDON, July 16.—DeLesseps informed a Paris correspondent of the rejection of his agreement with the British government regarding a parallel Suez canal, which he thought improbable, he would appeal to the opinion of the whole world and would seek for the support of the French government in resisting English demands.

Cholera in Egypt.

ALEXANDRIA, July 16.—Thirty-five deaths from cholera at Damietta occurred yesterday. At Matruh, 22 deaths from cholera and 20 at Manshieh. A panic at Alexandria caused by fear of cholera reaching here has been renewed and people are leaving the city in large numbers. Two cases of disease supposed to be cholera are reported at Bahig. Six deaths from cholera occurred at Waga.

A Mammoth Corporation.

JEFFERSON CITY (Mo.), July 16.—The Walnut Land and Coal Company of Bates county, Mo., incorporated today with a capital stock of \$1,000,000. The incorporators are Governor Charles Foster, of Ohio, ex-Speaker J. Warren Keifer and Congressman Amos Towns, of Ohio, Senator Plumb, of Kansas, Senator Miller and Thomas M. Nichol, of New York, John Scullen of St. Louis, B. J. Watson, of Fort Scott, Kan., and James I. Pace, of Butler, Missouri. The object is the establishment of the proposed town of Walnut, Bates county, and the development of adjacent mining lands.

A Father's Heroism.

AGASSIS (Conn.) Dispatch to N. Y. Times, July 3. A heartrending accident occurred here yesterday afternoon, whereby John Murphy, 33 years old, sacrificed his life to save two of his children. 
