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LATE TELEGRAMS. SPECIAL TO THE HERALD. An Infamous Verdict. SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The coroner's jury in the case of Shanahan, who died shortly after being severely injured and arrested by two policemen, has rendered a verdict that the deceased came to his death from the effects of a blow struck by a person unknown.

A Pioneer Suicide. BODIE, Cal., Aug. 1.—Chester W. Mills, a carpenter, 51 years of age, suicided this morning by blowing out his brains with a revolver. The wife of the deceased arrived on the morning train. Domestic infelicity is believed to have been the cause of the act. The deceased was living with a third wife. He was a pioneer in this section, having lived here twenty years.

Trouble With the Wires. CHICAGO, August 1.—The working of a number of Western Union wires seriously interfered with to-day, the circuits being broken by connecting the lines by means of fine copper wires. The cause of the trouble was finally located and removed. Workman Morris intimates that the brotherhood will probably be compelled to order out the members working for the railroads very soon. He denies the statement that fifteen men returned to work in New York yesterday. He says that only 25 have returned over the entire country since the inauguration of the strike.

An Inhuman Hoax. DENVER, July 31.—A report was sent East last night, probably from some mountain town, that the Grand Army of the Republic had been ordered to march on Black Canon and about one hundred and thirty lives lost. It is the most cruel hoax ever perpetrated on the public. Not a fatal railroad accident has occurred in Colorado or Utah in months and the particular train said to have been wrecked was not within a hundred miles of Black Canon at the time.

Bad for Coke Consumers. PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 1.—A syndicate, composed of prominent New York capitalists, including W. K. Vanderbilt, has formed for the purpose of obtaining control of the coke production in the Connellsville region. Their object is to establish an arbitrary selling rate for coke and also to divert the business of the region to the Vanderbilt line. A large quantity of valuable coke property has already been secured.

A Victim of the Floods. CINCINNATI, July 31.—Workmen, while digging ground in the vicinity of the Cincinnati Southern Railway depot yesterday morning, discovered the body of young Weber, who was lost last February at the time the flood swept away a portion of the depot.

The Milling of Carey. CAREY, Ohio, July 31.—O'Donnell was examined before a jury of twelve magistrates to-day on a charge of murder for killing James Carey, the informer. According to the evidence given Carey and O'Donnell had been drinking in the second class cabin just before the murder; when the steamer was half way between Sable and Carey, O'Donnell suddenly shot Carey in the neck with a revolver. Carey staggered away and O'Donnell followed and shot him twice in the chest. Carey died in twenty minutes. O'Donnell says he was a California digger; that he had lost largely in silver mining; that he was aware of Carey's condition but he was stated in the papers who Power was. He then determined to kill him.

In Fines. St. Petersburg, July 31.—One hundred and eighty houses have been destroyed by fire in the town of Semecov, in the Government of Nijni Novgorod.

General Vienna. VIENNA, Aug. 1.—The Municipality has voted a large sum of money to the relief of the earthquake sufferers in Ischia.

A Narrow Escape from Behaving. An accident which came within one of being a fatality occurred at the factory of the Scoville manufacturing company, in this city, Wednesday afternoon, says the Waterbury, (Conn.) American. Kate Coughlan, a girl employed in the button shop, went to the elevator well, and leaning over the iron bar which protects the opening, was engaged in conversation with another employe at the opening below concerning the shipping of some goods. While thus engaged, the elevator, which was in an upper story, was started by a man with a loaded truck, and commenced its descent. Miss Coughlan received no indication of her imminent peril until the elevator struck the back of her head, and forcing it forward, pinned the neck firmly to the cross bar. Had it gone any inch farther it would have beheld the girl; but at this moment the man below realized the danger and stopped the machine. As it was, the pressure was so great that the girl's eyes started from their sockets, and her tongue protruded from her mouth, and her head twisted around sideways, producing concussion of the spine and temporary paralysis of the left shoulder and arm. The man on the elevator, unconscious of the cause of the stopping, endeavored to start it again, but was fortunately unsuccessful. Assistance was at hand, and the motor stopped by main strength, the girl released. To-day Miss Coughlan has entirely recovered the use of the paralyzed arm, and beyond a protuberant neck, experienced no ill effects from the accident. She has reason to feel thankful for her very narrow escape from a terrible death.

The Unsavory Maritourists. The founder of the ducal house of Marlborough, was John Churchill, the greatest general and meaneast man in English history. He purchased the favor of the Duke of York through his sister, and after winning fame as a general betrayed James and William, Tories and Whigs. He won many famous victories over the French—among them Ramillies, Blenheim and Malplaquet. Titles, pensions, presents, etc., were heaped upon him and he died the richest man in England. It is related that he carried upon his army rolls for years the names of dead men whose wages he drew and pocketed. His descendants, wrecked in a total loss, the seventh Duke of Marlborough, who died the other day, was a man of respectable parts and fair character. From 1870 to 1880 he was vicar of Ireland. His eldest son, the Marquis of Blandford, has been rather conspicuous in the English reviews for the last three or four years as a writer of extremely radical articles on political subjects. But, as the New York Times says, a Duke, a Marquis, a Viscount, a possession are very different persons, and a radical Duke with a rent roll of \$41,000 and an annual income of \$25,000 is an anomaly in nature. The views of the new duke have possibly undergone a change in the direction of conservatism within the past day or two. If he do not reinforce the zeal, scarcely according to knowledge, with which his brother, Lord Randolph Churchill, is fighting for the Conservative cause in the House of Commons.

A Story of Gortschakoff. When the Russian nihilist Hartmann's condition was relaxed by France Alexander II became very much interested in order M. De Giers to forward an angry protest to the French Government. Gortschakoff, then very old and infirm, caused himself to be carried to the Winter Palace, and after a long and stormy interview with the Czar, succeeded in convincing the Emperor of the necessity of the friendly spirit of the diplomatic instrument. Gortschakoff could stand no more. "Tell the Czar," he said to his staff officer, "that I cannot put my name at the foot of a historical document that will be harmful to a country I served devotedly for more than sixty years. I am now too weak to fight against my master's will, yet strong enough to send in my resignation." "Tell Gortschakoff," Alexander replied, "that he will die as he has lived, in the skin of a most stubborn boar and be it done as he wishes." "I will do it," said the staff officer.
