Items of Interest:

Instead of \$2000 loss by a fire in Fresno last week, as was reported.

No epidemic or contagious fever exists at either Mazatlan or San Blas, Mexico.

Jean Wladislawski, the wife-murderer, in San Jose, asked for something to eat Friday morning, after fasting twelve days.

The United States mail steamer Enterprise was considerably damaged by fire at Fort Townsend, V. I., Friday night.

The Kootenai Railroad of British Columbia have elected J. C. Alsworth, J. W. Sprague and W. J. Alsworth, Directors.

In a hard fought battle at Portland, Or., Saturday night, between the Laurier and Dave Campbell, the former was badly whipped.

The managers of the Home of Benevolence at San Jose will investigate the charges of cruelty, etc., preferred against the matron, Mrs. Waisell.

By a defective fire in the pump house at Toros, Mex., was destroyed by fire Monday night, but the engines and machinery were unharmed.

Grand jurors attacked a vineyard near Fresno last week. The army numbered several millions, but they were successfully fought by a band of young toughs that routed them in two days.

On Greenwood, who shot and killed Robert Watson in Tuolumne county on Thursday morning, has been discharged by Justice W. L. Cooper, Gallagher, who killed Mrs. Greenwood, has not had an examination.

A military exploring expedition similar to that under command of Lieutenant Schwatka is being organized at Vancouver and will start north shortly. The expedition will be under command of Lieutenant Abercrombie.

By a provision of the law clothing, which heretofore paid no stamp duty, will pay from 5 per cent to 10 per cent on the cost of manufacture.
