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Local News Notes. Most of our largest sized paintings are being sold at the late sale of the late Mr. Martin Devine, a boy, was arrested yesterday on a charge of larceny. He is said to have stolen a \$20 piece.

Important change of Zanja Madre. The delay in making the culvert on the North Main street extension is said to be caused by an effort to change the Zanja Madre from its present line where it crosses Upper Main street to the west line of Alameda street, following along that street below Marchessault street, where it would remain its former course.

Change in the line of the zanja would destroy the water power at the junction of Marchessault and Alameda streets, which rents for \$120 per year, but it is thought that the increase in the value of the taxable property along the line would compensate for the change.

There is another feature of this alteration that is of more importance. It is proposed to make a brick culvert all the way from Olvera street to the Capital Mills as a conduit for the water of this zanja. This will prevent the wild, fierce streams of water and sand that dash down Colza, Virgin, High and Marchessault streets from running into the zanja and choking it up and forcing the water into Alameda street as they now do.

In addition to the starvation victims mentioned in the HERALD yesterday there was omitted a youth about 18 years old who has been sent from the Santa Monica to the North Main street. Mr. R. B. Curtis is a resident of the Phillips reservoir at Covina, and is getting full. The fact that the content is water is understood that the City Surveyor is in the water.
