

TOWN OF ORANGE. A Land of Wealth and Comfortable Homes. PHEERLESS PLAIN OF BEAUTY. A Great Garden of Fruits, Flowers and All Good Things.

The beautiful village of Orange is situated on the south side of the Santa Ana river, thirty-two miles southeast of Los Angeles, in the center of that portion of the Santa Ana valley that is bounded by the river on the west, the ocean on the south, and the Santiago hills and mountains on the north and east. In this grand slope of territory of 16,000 acres of gravelly loam, changing to dark alluvial on the lower side, lies the beautiful town of Orange, very nearly in the geographical center of the tract. The land is a part of the rancho Santiago de Santa Ana, and was surveyed into small tracts in 1870. In 1871 this portion called the A. B. Chapman tract was laid out in small tracts where the Orange business center now stands and the Chapman ditch was completed to the tract during the same year.

A few settlers of small means located on this land in that year, but orange trees were so dear that they could not afford to buy and plant them. The same conditions prevailed in 1872. In 1873 a few orange trees were planted by new settlers of larger means, and the remarkable growth which these trees made induced others to plant freely in 1874. In the following years more trees were planted in Orange, Tustin and Santa Ana, and steadily the orchards of vineyards stretched over the plain, till the grand Damascus-like town of Orange, rich in all that humanity needs from the bosom of nature, is now displayed in beautiful garments of green and gold, and the air made voluptuously sweet by the fragrance of flowers.

Orange has taken no step backward. The houses have been improved and made beautiful, lawns, yards and gardens have been planted and tended with the utmost care. The town in 1877 purchased an interest in the ditch of the Santa Ana Valley Irrigation Company that had begun a ditch on the south bank of the Santa Ana. By combining this water right with the previous right, it obtained in the following year a grand water supply. The ditch is twelve miles long, twenty-six feet wide at the top, ten feet wide at the bottom and six feet deep, carrying fifty heads of water. This grand supply gave a tremendous growth to all the South Santa Ana valley.

The ditch has a heavy fall and one of its branches is utilized to turn a fine flouring mill. The fall at the mill is fifty-six feet and has power to grind all the grain in the valley and produce enough electricity to light all the towns on both sides of the river. The main ditch and branches are fifty miles in length, and are owned by the land owners according to acreage. There is no expense for the use of water except the cost of keeping the ditches in repair.

The system works to a charm, and all the cultivators have an abundance of water. The raising of barley and alfalfa in Orange, is only to a moderate extent for hay, while nearly all the land is occupied with orchards and vineyards, which pay a much better reward for labor than small grain.

In 1876 the business of wine-making began in a moderate way. The business has steadily increased till about 300,000 gallons are made annually in the three varieties of the town. The quality of the Port wine of Orange is very fine for young wine.

RABBIT MARKING. The business of raising rabbits in Orange is marching on with gigantic strides. From a small beginning, in 1877, when but a few boxes were made, the crop now reaches 200,000 boxes of most excellent rabbits. Many young vineyards will this year increase their yield so that about 250,000 boxes will be the peak of 1887. Besides this large amount of rabbits, vast amounts of dressed carcasses are shipped East in refrigerated cars.

FRUIT MARKING. The freight depot was opened at Orange February 24, 1886, and the following amount of freight was forwarded between February 24, 1886, and June 30th 1886, as furnished by the railroad agent, Mr. C. D. Ellis:

is a very rich showing for four or five days and shows wonderful productive power of the soil. The people of Orange do not yet waste land. Every land owner has a share in the bounty of the soil. The beautiful Palmyra vineyard owned by Mr. C. Z. Oliver, laid part down by, is a grand, constant to the day.

RAILWAY FACILITIES. Southern Pacific Company's track along the south side of the settlement, the Alhambra, Tustin and

Santa Ana railway is making a new line between the town center, and the Southern Pacific line and about eighty rods from the town center. The town will then have two lines of steam railway to all parts of the United States. A street railway is built from Santa Ana to Orange, and the same will be extended to McPherson, a suburb of Orange on the east, and to the Quaker town of Earlham, three miles away northwesterly, and thence to beautiful Tustin City, making a circuit of a dozen miles and connecting all the five settlements with a box of steel.

Orange has five churches, two hotels, a bank and fine and elegant schoolhouses. The orange groves and apricot orchards are trimmed in the low pruning fashion, and present a beautiful appearance. The vineyards are watered in the winter only, when there is a large amount of water that would otherwise run to waste, and when there are no branches to interfere with the process of irrigating. The grapes on the warm, gravelly land of Orange mature about two weeks earlier than the same variety ripens in the city of Los Angeles, and the apricot crop of Orange is very fine, and the caused apricot of that town are unsurpassed in excellence. It is also noticeable that in a drive about the town there is seldom a sign of property for sale. The settlers seem to be content with their locality, and all they may be for foreign towns might be visited in all parts of California without finding so charming a place for homes as beautiful Orange.

Fig Trees. Fig trees begin to bear in eighteen months after planting, and continue to increase in size and bearing capacity for more than half a century. No insect pests disturb this tree, and the crop can be gathered at leisure and dried, canned or crystallized for market. There is a demand for all the white figs that can be grown, at \$50 per ton, and at this rate the crop from ten-year-old trees is worth \$400 an acre, net.—[Echo.]
