Springer, the Wife Murderer Arrested at Last.

BARTLETT SPRINGS FOR SALE.

Land Troubles Cause a Tragedy at Callistoga—Spring Races at San Francisco.

TUCSON, April 15.—A Star's special from Globe says: The supposed William Springer, charged with the murder of his wife in Colton, Cal., on January 4th, is in custody here. THE BARTLETT SPRINGS To Be Sold at Public Auction in June.

LAKEPORT, Cal., April 15.—The partition suit brought by the estate of Mc Mahon against Bartlett, joint owners of the Bartlett's Springs, came up in the Superior Court to-day, and on application of the plaintiff's attorneys the court granted an order to sell the celebrated Bartlett Springs property, situated in the northeast part of this county. The sale is to be at public auction, June 2, 1887.

A DOUBLE TRAGEDY Caused by Bitterness Resulting From a Land Controversy.

CALISTOGA, Cal., April 15.—About 9 o'clock this morning a man named Turner approached J. W. Roberts who was hoeing in his garden and said: "I am going to kill you." Scarcely had he finished his warning when he fired two shots from a revolver, both of which took effect in Roberts' body. Turner then shot himself in the head and almost instantly expired. A doctor who was immediately summoned, attended the wounded man and pronounced Roberts' chances for recovery very slight. His wife and children are nearly frantic with grief. Turner leaves a wife and several children. The circumstances which led to the shooting are as follows: Roberts, some time ago, had his ranch surveyed and it was discovered that a portion of the land claimed by Turner, who owned the vineyard adjoining, belonged to Roberts. Since then Turner has had a bitter feeling towards Roberts.

A PREMATURE BLAST.

Six Men Killed and Seven Wounded in a Colorado Mine.

VENA VISTA, Col., April 15.—At 5 o'clock last evening a premature blast killed six men and wounded seven at the camp of Kynor, Higby & Bernard, while working in the sixty-foot cut on the Midland grade, near Buena Vista. A twenty-foot hole had been put down to blow off the face of the cut, and sprung with twenty kegs of blasting giant powder. The foreman was blasting the charge, and when he had finished it discharged, throwing masses of rocks into the cut, where thirteen men were working, instantly killing six and wounding seven. Some claim that the explosion was caused by a falling rock, while others say there are conflicting statements, however, in this respect.

YREKA, April 15.—A man has been arrested at Fort Jones answering the description of Pete Olsen, Mrs. Lyons' murderer. His clothes compare, but are not ragged. He has a scar under the left eye, which he claims was caused in going through the brush, but it looks as if it had been caused from a burn or blow. He has a bald spot on the back of his head the size of a quarter.

Short of Coal.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—The steamer City of Topeka, with ballast and stores and thirteen passengers, bound from San Pedro to Tacoma, put into this port to-day to procure a supply of coal.

INCORPORATED.

The Seattle and West Coast Railway Company.

SEATTLE, W. T., April 15.—Articles of incorporation of the Seattle and West Coast Railway Company have been filed. The objects for which this corporation is formed is "to construct and equip a railroad and telegraph line from Seattle, W. T., by the most practicable route to such a point on the northern boundary line of the United States as may prove most convenient to effect a junction with the Canadian Pacific Railway." The line of the Seattle and West Coast railway will run from the junction of the Seattle and Eastern railway, a few miles from this city, north, in the direction of the city of Vancouver, British Columbia, and Whistler. The surveys of the route to Vancouver and Whistler are now completed. The capital stock of the corporation will be \$1,000,000, divided into 10,000 shares. The officers of the company are Henry Crawford, Jr., President; Henry Crawford, of Chicago, Vice President; W. J. Jennings, Secretary and Treasurer. The offices and principal place of business will be at Seattle.

The National Opera Company.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—Mr. Seymour Locke, of the National Opera Company, received to-night from Cheyenne a dispatch from his brother, Chas. Locke, general manager of the company, stating that the full company will arrive here on Sunday morning. The company is the largest which ever has come to the Pacific Coast. The train consists of twenty cars, composed of nineteen baggage, seven Wagner sleepers, three day coaches and one observation car. It is divided into four sections. The troupe comprises three hundred persons. The sale of seats which began last Monday has continued throughout the week, and the receipts to advance sales are already so large as to guarantee a prosperous season.

Acquitted of Felony.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—George W. Tyler, charged with procuring the affidavit of an incompetent person, Mrs. Isabella Clarke, for use in the Sharon case, was acquitted by the jury yesterday after a ten minutes' deliberation. The evidence failed to show that Mrs. Clarke was mentally incompetent at the time the affidavit was taken.

A Grocer Shoots Himself.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—Charles Karaton, a grocery proprietor, committed suicide this morning by shooting himself in the head with a single shot pistol. Financial troubles are understood to have been the cause of the deed.

A Fool Pardoned.

PORTLAND, Ogn., April 15.—Governor Penneyer, has pardoned E. W. James, who accidentally shot and killed Mrs. Julia A. Newton, at Albina, while pointing a gun to scare her, for which he was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary.

A Schooner Reported Safe.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, April 16.—Joe Smith, a fisherman who lives near Cave Landing, has just come in from the beach and reports that he, with another fisherman, has the schooner Joshua Grindle anchored out on the bay.

Review of the Day's Transactions.

NEW YORK, April 15.—The stock market to-day was the dulllest for the past two weeks. It was feverish and unsettled, but on the whole heavy. The market was weak at opening, first showing a decline of 1/4 cent. The market showed feverishness and irregularity. Prices were generally heavy, however, over the entire list. A decline was continued until nearly noon, when a better feeling was apparent, but the market became decidedly dull. A period of comparative stagnation of prices ensued which lasted until about 1 p. m., when another general decline was effected. The market closed with a rally, however, quiet and steady.
