More Talk About the Parnell Letter.

LORD SALISBURY'S ADDRESS. The Fisheries Question Again Revived—Correspondence Said to Have Passed.

LONDON, April 20.—Several of the Gladstone Liberals desire to have Parliament issue a summons to the editor of the Times, calling him before the bar of the House of Commons, to answer for a breach of privilege in accusing Parnell and other members of the House with complicity in crime.

LORD SALISBURY'S ADDRESS. LONDON, April 20.—Lord Salisbury in an address delivered last night before the Primrose League, at Albert Palace, the occasion being the sixth anniversary of the death of Lord Beaconsfield, said that the present Irish Crisis would not compare in stringency with Gladstone's bill of 1881.

Ordered More Rails. SAN DIEGO, April 20.—The San Diego and Old Town street railroad ordered to-day 120 tons of steel rails from the Pacific mills, in San Francisco, to be used in completing their road from this city to Old San Diego.

Western Union Stock Increase. NEW YORK, April 20.—A statement was filed in the County Clerk's office to-day, showing that the Directors of the Western Union Telegraph Company, by two-thirds vote, had increased the total stock \$1,200,000, making a total capital of \$81,200,000.

Burned to the Ground. SALT LAKE, April 20.—The Board of Trade building at Logan, full of agricultural machinery and wagons, was burned to the ground on Monday night.

A New Silver Vault. WASHINGTON, April 20.—Arrangements are now being made at the Treasury department for the construction of a new silver vault in that building to accommodate the rapidly accumulating standard silver dollars.

Senator Stewart's Residence Scorched. CARSON, Nev., April 20.—Senator Stewart's residence caught fire to-day and a portion of the house was burned. Prompt action of the firemen saved the place.

Merry Duchess Wins the Race. LONDON, April 20.—The city and suburban handicap race, for one thousand sovereigns, was won by Merry Duchess, with Carlton second and Castror third.

W. T. Lewis Dead. SAN ANTONIO, Cal., April 20.—Hon. W. T. Lewis, ex-Senator and District Attorney of this county for fifteen years past, died here to-day of cancer of the tongue.

Conservators Sentenced. ST. PETERSBURG, April 20.—Six of the men arrested for complicity in the plot to assassinate the Czar, which was carried out on the 13th of March, have been sentenced to death. The other conspirators have been sentenced to imprisonment for life.

Prohibition Bill Defeated. HALIFAX, April 20.—A special cable dispatch from St. Johns, N. F., says the bill for the total prohibition of the liquor traffic was defeated in the Assembly by the casting of a vote by the Speaker, but that it will certainly be carried next session.

A Plot to Kill the Czar. LONDON, April 20.—The police at Kiev and Odessa have discovered a plot to kill the Czar by blowing up the Imperial train in the event of the Czar's visiting Southern Russia.

Call for Bonds. WASHINGTON, April 20.—It is expected that another call for three-per-cent bonds will be made in a few days. There are now outstanding \$19,824,000 in three-per-cent bonds, of which \$16,491,900 are held by national banks, \$3,235,700 by residents of the United States, and \$1,100,000 by foreign residents.

GLADSTONE.

He Becomes Very Friendly to the Irish.

LONDON, April 20.—Gladstone writes: "I attach very high value to the importance of the manifestations, now incessant, of American as well as Colonial sympathy with the Irish people in the crisis created by the causeless insult of the invidious bill at present before Parliament. Apart from particular and, more or less, formal acknowledgments, I am not of the opinion that it would be proper or expedient in me to take it upon myself to address any general communication to America on this subject, which, however, I noticed, and may again notice in Parliament. Still, I am very anxious that the people of this country should have some means of understanding how much beyond the range of any sectional impulses, and how truly national the movement in the United States has become; and in that view I would recommend that every endeavor be made to present some estimate of the aggregate number of persons by which the recent meetings in America have been attended, likewise especially an estimate of the number of Governors, Mayors, Senators, Representatives, Clergymen and other official or highly responsible persons, by whom such meetings were countenanced or supported.

A Famous Anarchist in Chicago.

CHICAGO, April 20.—The Daily News to-morrow will say that a letter from Rudolf Schnaubelt, the much looked for Anarchist and alleged thrower of bombs in Hay Market, has been received in Chicago, and that those who are in a position to know do not for a moment doubt its authenticity. The letter is dated Christiania, Norway, March 1887, and reached here through the medium of the Anarchist sheet issued in London by an Austrian Socialist, named, Joseph Peikert, who is an old friend of Schnaubelt's.

Royalty Invades San Francisco.

A RECEPTION ACCORDED HER. She Will Visit the President and Then Go to the Queen's Jubilee.
