

ARCHBISHOP ALEMANY.

A California Priest Visits His Grace in Spain.

Rev. A. de Campos, rector of the parish of San Leandro, who recently returned from a visit to his relatives in Portugal and Spain, had also the pleasure in being received by his Grace Most Rev. Dr. Jose Sado Alemany, the former respected Archbishop of this see.

Father de Campos found the Archbishop saying mass in the church of Nuestra Señora del Pilar, in Valencia. As soon as the service was finished the reverend gentleman followed the Archbishop into the sacristy, where the beloved prelate welcomed him cordially. He said that Father de Campos was the first one who had visited him from California. The Archbishop appeared to derive particular pleasure from conversing in English, a privilege which he said he had not enjoyed since he left America.

Father de Campos describes a walk which he had through the streets of Valencia with the Archbishop as companion, for in Spain no prelate could think of leaving his palace without an attendant. The custom is the reverse of agreeable to the venerable Archbishop, who alluded regretfully to the untrammelled liberty to which he was accustomed in California.

It affected Father de Campos deeply to see the people of all ages and sexes leave their houses when they saw the Archbishop passing, and kneel before him on the stones to receive his benediction.

The Archbishop is treated by all classes in Valencia with the most distinguished reverence. He is known in Spain as the "Bishop of California," it appearing difficult for the Spaniards to realize that that far-away "province of California" should now have a metropolitan See, with four suffragan bishops.

The aged Archbishop could not hear enough about his quinine and malaria, and was greatly delighted to hear of the affection and reverence in which his memory is still held here.

On parting, the Archbishop sent "his blessing, his regard and his good wishes to all in California."

Father de Campos says that the Archbishop has not changed much since he left California. He is at present engaged in building a convent for some members of his order, in which, in all probability, he will take a well-deserved rest.—[San Francisco Call.]

About the Mosquito.

The long cylindrical legs of mosquitoes are laid in little pockets which float on the surface of standing water. In four weeks after hatching the insect passes through its transformation and becomes an enemy to man's comfort. The young mosquito in the larva state is aquatic, living like fish in ponds, lakes and stagnant water. It is fish-like in shape, with the head and adjoining parts much enlarged, and breathes by means of a bunch of hairs radiating from a long tubercle at the end of the body and connecting with the internal respiratory tubes. It remains most of the time after coming from the egg at the bottom, feeding upon decaying matter, and is thus very beneficial as a scavenger. Later it becomes very active, jerking up and down in the water, aided by a pair of broad caudal leaves. When observed constantly about the surface of the water, it is a sure sign it is about to assume the full shape and powers of a mosquito. The aquatic animal is seen to crawl on some substance floating on the water—a leaf of bit of twig—give a twist or two, split its coverings and in a short time put out wings and float away. The males, which may be distinguished by their bushy horns or feelers in front of their heads, do not bite. It is the female who gives all the trouble—singing and biting. No poison-gland has yet been found in the mosquito's head, and it is generally thought that the inflammation and swelling following the bite of mosquitoes are due to irritation set up by their slightly barbed jaws, and perhaps the saliva is slightly acrid. Under the microscope the soft, plastic foot of the mosquito is seen to be fringed. It may comfort those who suffer from the attack of these insects to know that mosquitoes have their personal troubles also, as the microscope shows vermin on them not uninfrequently.

A Big Tent.

The Native Sons have secured a mammoth tent to be erected in Napa for the order on Admission Day. This tent or pavilion will be 150 feet long by 100 feet wide and will accommodate about 3000 people. A fine floor will be laid under this tent, and in the afternoon literary exercises will be held there, while in the evening the floor will be cleared and devoted to dancing. At none of the celebrations given by the Native Sons has such a large platform been furnished. Napa Parlor is taking hold of this celebration in a manner that assures success. For three days Napa will be crowded with visitors and our town will have a veritable boom.—Reporter
