DEATH'S DOINGS.

Inquests Here and at San Pedro. The Faith Cure.

Coroner J. M. Meredith held an inquest last night on the body of Mrs. Laura Ella Graves, a native of Illinois, aged 29 years, who came to her death by injuries received by the explosion of a coal oil stove.

Mrs. Graves poured a quantity of oil into the stove and then proceeded to light it, but the heat of the stove caused an explosion and before she was aware her dress had caught fire.

She ran into the street, where a gentleman extinguished the flames. The jury returned the following verdict: "That the deceased came to her death by injuries sustained accidentally while lighting a fire with kerosene oil."

AT SAN PEDRO. Another inquest was held yesterday afternoon by the Justice of the Peace at San Pedro on the body of Mr. Mooney who was run over by a switch engine in the South Pacific yard at San Pedro on Tuesday afternoon, whilst trying to board a train.

GRAND JURY INDICTMENTS. The Clock Game Stopped - A Strange Proceeding.

Some time since it was made public that the Grand Jury was hearing evidence in the matter of the Turf and Grain Exchange, and it was supposed that some action would be taken by that body.

Consequently, when it became known yesterday that of the seven indictments returned, six were for people alleged to be connected with the institution, very few were surprised.

The first indication of the nature of the indictment was when H. T. Rodman was taken into custody on a warrant charging him with conducting an establishment where gambling was carried on.

There were two indictments against Mr. Rodman, one charging the same thing and bail was fixed at \$500 on each, which was furnished.

It was afterwards learned that there were two indictments against Christopher Buckley and Henry Schwarz, but as both of these gentlemen are in San Francisco the warrants were not served.

The fact that indictments had been found against Christopher Buckley was considered as a mistake for it is authoritatively stated that Mr. Buckley has no interest in the institution and never had.

Mr. Rodman said that Mr. Buckley had no more to do with the exchange than the veriest stranger. He happened to be a friend of Mr. Schwarz but had not furnished a dollar toward the institution.

Other gentlemen who are quite intimate with Christopher Buckley also state that he is not connected with the exchange and that the Grand Jury is regarded by them as very strange.

Two prominent attorneys stated, if Mr. Buckley was not a member of the firm he had good cause for redress.

As soon as the warrant had been served on Mr. Rodman the clock by which grain values were made was stopped and remained so the balance of the day.

WILD HORSES. A 870 Animal Caught in Antelope Valley.

Mr. Clayton Gillibrand, of Antelope valley, has been out wild-horse hunting on the prairies to the east of his residence at Lancaster, and has succeeded in securing one of the untrammelled steeds that rove thereabouts.

He encountered a band of eight when about thirty miles from Lancaster, and ran them down in the usual manner, employing three horses in the operation.

He only succeeded in securing one, however, but is amply repaid for his two days labor, as the animal will be worth about \$70 when broken.

It is a fine three-year-old roan, with a mane and tail sweeping the ground and contrary to expectation submitted to the operation of branding and saddling with even more grace than the average pasture-bred animal.
