

CITY PRECINCTS. Subdivision by the Supervisors Into Thirty-Seven.

HOW THEY ARE TO BE BOUNDED. A Matter of Great Interest to the Twelve Thousand Voters of Los Angeles.

As announced by the Herald a few days since, the Supervisors have divided the city into thirty-seven precincts, each to contain no more than three hundred voters. These divisions while not yet adopted...

SECOND SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT. First Precinct—Bounded north by northern city boundary, E. by eastern boundary, S. by Downey avenue and prolongation...

Second Precinct—Bounded north by Downey avenue and prolongation to eastern city boundary, E. by eastern city boundary, S. by S. P. R. R. and W. by Los Angeles river.

Third Precinct—Bounded north by S. P. R. R., E. by east city boundary, southerly by Brooklyn avenue, Baily street, Aliso avenue and First street, W. by Los Angeles river.

Fourth Precinct—Bounded northerly by First street, Aliso avenue, Baily street and Brooklyn avenue, E. by east city boundary, S. by south city charter boundary, W. by Los Angeles river.

Fifth Precinct—Bounded N. by Mission street, E. by Los Angeles river, S. by Sainsavain street, W. by Alameda street.

Sixth Precinct—Bounded N. by Sainsavain street, E. by Los Angeles river, S. by First street, W. by Alameda street.

Seventh Precinct—Bounded N. by junction of Main and Alameda streets, E. by Alameda street, S. by Requena street, W. by Main street.

Eighth Precinct—Bounded N. by Requena street, E. by Alameda street, S. by First street and W. by Main street.

Ninth Precinct—Bounded N. by First street, E. by Los Angeles river, S. by Seventh street and W. by Alameda street.

Tenth Precinct—Bounded N. by Seventh street, E. by Los Angeles river, S. by south charter boundary of city and W. by Alameda street.

Eleventh Precinct—Bounded N. by First street, E. by Alameda street, S. by Seventh street and W. by San Pedro street.

Twelfth Precinct—Bounded N. by Seventh street, E. by Alameda street, S. by south charter boundary of city and W. by San Pedro street.

Thirteenth Precinct—Bounded N. by First street, E. by San Pedro street, S. by Fourth street and W. by Main street.

Fourteenth Precinct—Bounded N. by Fourth street, E. by San Pedro street, S. by Seventh street and W. by Main street.

Fifteenth Precinct—Bounded N. by Seventh street, E. by San Pedro street, S. by Washington street and W. by Main street.

Sixteenth Precinct—Bounded N. by Washington street, E. by San Pedro street, S. by south charter boundary of city and W. by Main street.

Seventeenth Precinct—Bounded N. by Washington street, E. by Main street and S. by south charter boundary of city and W. by Figueroa street and W. boundary of Zobelean's land.

Eighteenth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Pico street, E. by Figueroa street and west boundary of Zobelean's land, S. by south charter boundary of city and W. by west boundary of city.

Nineteenth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Pico street, E. by Main street, S. by Washington street and W. by Figueroa street.

Twentieth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Ninth street, E. by Main street, S. by Pico street and W. by Pearl street.

Twenty-first Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Ninth street, E. by Pearl street, S. by Pico street and W. by west boundary of city.

Twenty-second Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Sixth street, E. by Main street, S. by Ninth street and W. by Pearl street.

Twenty-third Precinct—Commencing at intersection of Diamond and Figueroa streets and running S. along Figueroa street to the corner of Second and Figueroa streets, thence E. along Second street to the corner of Second and Pearl streets, thence S. along Pearl street to the corner of Pearl and Ninth streets, thence W. along Ninth street to the west boundary of city, thence N. along west boundary of city, thence E. along Diamond street to point of beginning.

Twenty-fourth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Fourth street, E. by Main street, S. by Sixth street and W. by Olive street.

Twenty-fifth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Fourth street, E. by Olive street, S. by Sixth street and W. by Pearl street.

Twenty-sixth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Second street, E. by Main street, S. by Fourth street and W. by Olive street.

Twenty-seventh Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Second street, E. by Olive street, S. by Fort street and W. by Pearl street.

Twenty-eighth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Temple street, E. by Main street, S. by Second street and W. by Olive street.

Twenty-ninth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Temple street, E. by Olive street, S. by Second street and W. by Figueroa street.

Thirtieth Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Temple street, E. by Figueroa street, S. by Diamond street and W. by W. boundary of city.

Thirty-first Precinct—Commencing at the corner of Upper Main street and Bellevue avenue and running W. along Bellevue avenue to Castelar street, thence S. along Castelar street to Temple street, thence E. along Temple street to Main street, thence N. along Main street to Marchessault street, thence W. along Marchessault street to the corner of Upper Main street, thence N. along Upper Main street to point of beginning.

Thirty-second Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Bellevue avenue, E. by Castelar street, S. by Temple street and W. by Beaudry avenue.

Thirty-third Precinct—Bounded on the N. by Reservoir street, N. E. by Dutch Farm Railroad, from N. E. it intersects the center line of Bellevue avenue, E. by Beaudry avenue, S. by Temple street and W. by W. boundary of city.

Thirty-fourth Precinct—Commencing at the intersection of Main street (formerly Chavez) with W. boundary of Los Angeles river, thence S. along said
