

CRIME AND CASUALTY.

Chicago Dynamiters in Hot Water.

SENSATIONAL PROCEEDINGS.

Mysterious Bomb-Throwers at Sacramento-Collision at Sea. Expensive Fire.

[Associated Press Dispatches to the Herald.]

CHICAGO, July 18.—The course to be pursued in prosecuting the would-be assassins of Grinnell, Gary and Bonfield was decided upon this morning. It was semi-officially announced that the anarchist trio would be taken about noon before a justice and their cases continued for ten days. That would give an opportunity of presenting the murderers' conspiracy with the least possible delay to the Grand Jury, which assembles Monday. A speedy indictment and trial is hoped for by the authorities. The object is to make a lesson of justice so strikingly quick, if possible, as to make its influence doubly effective.

The prisoners were brought into court as arranged and after a brief statement by Inspector Bonfield, were held over. Their bonds were fixed at \$5,000 apiece.

A DECIDED SENSATION.

Another sensation was sprung upon the defense in the dynamite case to-day. John Wilson, one of the prisoners who was arrested with Broderick and Bowles as an anarchist conspirator and as a Brotherhood engineer, coolly left his seat in the group of which Broderick and Baerlein were members, and walked over to the side of the room where the prosecuting attorney sat. Wilson took a chair beside Mr. Dawes, attorney for the Burlington Company, and began to chat in a friendly manner. Then it was developed that Wilson was not an engineer, not a Brotherhood man and not even Wilson, his name is John Mulligan and he is a Pinkerton detective, and it appears that he has had the confidence of all the prisoners and their attorneys.

SACRAMENTO DYNAMITERS.

SACRAMENTO, July 18.—The persecution of the Soule family, who reside three miles east of this city, still continues. An attempt was recently made to blow up the residence with dynamite bombs, and this morning Mrs. Soule stated that last evening a blacksmith shop situated a short distance from the house took fire most mysteriously, and was entirely destroyed. A short time before the fire there had been a terrific explosion, and Mr. Soule went out on the front porch to keep watch over his packing house, when the blacksmith shop was discovered to be in flames. Mrs. Soule is still unable to account for the mysterious and outrageous persecution. She says that her husband and one of her sons are ill from exposure while watching to catch the bomb throwers. The dynamiters seem to know when watch is being kept, however, and do not appear at such times. The family have been in a state of siege over six weeks. Some times there are three or four explosions during the night, and where the missiles come from and how they get there is a mystery. Mrs. Soule came to the city to-day to hire a guard, as some members of her family are worn out with watching.

COLLISION AT SEA.

The Fulda Runs Down a Fishing Schooner.

NEW YORK, July 18.—The North German Lloyd steamship Fulda which arrived yesterday from Bremen run down an unknown fishing schooner on the banks of New Foundland Saturday. A dense fog prevailed at that time and the schooner disappeared astern immediately after the collision. Boats put out in search of her and for nearly an hour groped around in the fog but no traces of the schooner nor twenty of the men belonging to her were found. Many passengers on the steamer were horrified witnesses to the collision. The lost vessel was probably a French fisherman. The steamer's officers claim that the usual precautions were being taken when the collision occurred.

THE REPORTS EXAGGERATED.

Gustave Schwab, agent of the North German Lloyd line in this city, said to-day that the public reports of the collision were grossly exaggerated. Capt. Ring's official report, Agent Schwab said, stated that the Fulda struck the schooner in a dense fog, carrying away the bowsprit. This was all the damage that was done. The schooner Hall was not touched. The passengers on deck of the steamer at the time grew excited and threw a number of life preservers overboard, but this precaution was unnecessary. The cause of the accident according to the captain's statement was the neglect of the fisherman to sound his bells during the fog.

THE GALLOWES.

Two of New Jersey's Worst Criminals Executed.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 18.—Henry Ebert, the wife murderer, was hanged in the jail this morning. When the trap was sprung the knot slipped around under the jaw and disarranged the cap, so that Ebert's face was exposed to view as he slowly strangled to death. Ebert married his wife, who was a widow, to possess himself of \$1,500 which her first husband had bequeathed to the woman's child. Ebert failed in his object to get possession of the money, and then had his wife put in the insane asylum for the same purpose, and when she was released he shot her dead as she was entering their home. A pretended attempt to immediately kill himself was bootless, if, as is probably the case, he expected thereby to create sympathy.

FREHOLD, N. J., July 18.—Richard Kearney was hanged here to-day. He was the coachman who attempted a criminal assault on Mrs. Purcell, and was employed by the wealthy Lyddy family at Elberon. Kearney was foiled by his victim, but he beat her so savagely that she died of her injuries.

CHAIRMEN'S GATHERING.

Destruction of Property and Lawless Acts Condemned.

CHICAGO, July 18.—Over one hundred and fifty chairmen of different Engineers and Firemen's Grievance Committees met here to-day, nearly every prominent railroad in the country being represented by one or more men. A delegate stated that the Burlington strike was being discussed, and that some conclusion would be reached before final adjournment. After the first session was over resolutions were shown as having been adopted, "expressing condemnation of lawless acts and destruction of property," and adding the termination "that the exercise of the power of this organization will be used to protect the innocent."

THE FARNELL TRIBUNAL.

The Government Bill for a Committee of Investigation.

LONDON, July 18.—Following is the text of the Government bill for the appointment of a special commission to inquire into the London Times charges against Irish members of Parliament:

WHEREAS, Charges and allegations have been made against certain members of the House of Commons and others by the defendants in the action of O'Donnell against Walter and others, it is expedient that a special commission be appointed to inquire into the truth of the charges and allegations, and that it should have such powers as may be necessary for the effectual conducting of the inquiry.

Be it therefore enacted, first, That three persons hereinafter mentioned, names not given, are hereby appointed commissioners for the purpose of this act. The commissioners shall inquire into and report upon the charges and allegations against certain members of the House of Commons and others in the action of O'Donnell against Walter and others.

Secondly, That the Commission shall, for the purposes of the inquiry, have all such powers, rights and privileges as are vested in Her Majesty's High Court of Justice, or any judge thereof, on the occasion of any action, including all the powers, rights and privileges in respect of the following matters: Enforcing the attendance of witnesses, examining them under oath, affirming or otherwise, compelling the production of documents, punishing persons guilty of contempt. The issue of a commission or a request to examine witnesses abroad, and summons signed by one or more of the Commissioners may be substituted for and be equivalent to any formal process capable of being issued in any action for enforcing the attendance of witnesses or compelling the production of documents.

Thirdly, That the persons implicated in said charges and allegations, the parties to said action and any person authorized by the Commissioners, may appear at the inquiry, and any person so appearing may be represented by counsel or solicitor.

Fourthly, That every person who on examination on oath or affirmation willfully gives false evidence shall be liable to the penalties for perjury.

Fifthly, That any witness may be cross-examined on behalf of any other person appearing before the Commissioners. A witness shall not be excused from answering any question put to him on the ground of any privilege, or on the ground that the answer may criminate or tend to criminate himself. No evidence taken under this act shall be admissible against any person in any civil or criminal proceedings, except in case the witness shall be accused of having given false evidence in the inquiry under this act.

Sixthly, That every person examined as a witness, who, in the opinion of the Commissioners, shall make a full and true disclosure and, if civil or criminal proceedings shall at any time thereafter be instituted against any such witness in respect of any matter whereon he shall be examined, the court having cognizance of the case shall, on proof of a certificate, stay proceedings, and may in its discretion award the witness such costs as he may be put to by reason of the proceedings.

AN EXPENSIVE FIRE.

A Magnificent Business Block Laid in Ashes.

CHICAGO, July 18.—The magnificent building at the northeast corner of Washburn and Monroe street, caught fire to-day and burned with a loss of nearly half a million dollars. The occupants were the Chicago Carpet Company, the piano manufacturing firm of Julius Bauer & Co., and the Standard Musical Company, dealers in musical instruments other than pianos. The fire was preceded by a terrific explosion in the basement. Almost instantly the whole of the basement was on fire. The dozen workmen there rushed up the stairway. So great was the confusion and narrow the escape, that some of the workmen believe part of their number were caught and burned to death. Janitor James Mahony is missing. Incendiarism is suspected on the part of a porter discharged recently by Bauer & Co. The insurance on the building was \$75,000.

The Chicago Carpet Company's loss is about \$70,000, of which \$50,000 is a total loss, as there was an uninsured stock valued at the sum just received from New York. Bauer's stock was valued at \$150,000 and was entirely destroyed. The stock was insured, but the amount of insurance was not obtainable. The Standard Musical Company's loss is about \$23,000.

Association Dissolved.

PITTSBURG, July 18.—The Western Iron Manufacturers Association was formally dissolved to-day. Members of the Association who have not signed the Amalgamated scale were absolved from all pledges, and authorized to act in their individual capacity regarding the starting of their works. A general resumption will probably take place in a few days.

California Fruits.

CHICAGO, July 18.—The prices of California fruits at auction to-day were as follows: Plums, \$1.20 to \$1.35; German prunes, \$1.20 to \$1.45. The four cars catalogued were sold, the other three cars not arriving on time. Prices were about the same as yesterday with the exception of peaches, which ran 5 cents higher.

Fanny Davenport Price.

NEW YORK, July 18.—Fanny Davenport Price, the actress, has been granted an absolute divorce by Judge Barrett, of the Supreme Court, from her husband, Henry Price. The decree was filed June 8th.
