Train No. 20 from the East was bulletined four hours late yesterday, the washouts near Pantano still proving detrimental to traffic.

General Cleanings.

An agency is to be established at Maitland (Park Station), on the Santa Monica line.

The quantity of potatoes annually shipped into London amounts to 400,000 tons.

Mr. W. D. Sanborn, General Coast Agent of the Burlington system, has returned from the East.

A new freight depot covering fourteen acres has been established by the Midland Railway in London.

Mr. Robert Low has been appointed Assistant General Manager in charge of the middle division of the Northern Pacific.

Mr. W. T. Vanston, Ticket Agent at London, Ont., of the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada, is in the city, accompanied by his wife.

The Canadian Pacific has declared a dividend of one and one-half per cent., payable August 17th, to stockholders of record July 13th.

The second preliminary survey is being made for the proposed branch from the Southern Pacific west, seven miles, to Treka, which is to be built by an independent company.

A remarkable feat in locomotive building is reported from Altoona, Pa. A passenger engine was constructed in seventeen hours, including the two hours occupied in testing the boiler.

The United States and Great Britain produced last year three-fourths of the steel and two-thirds of the iron made and consumed among enlightened nations.

Is There a Combination Among the Bidders?

There have from time to time been rumors in the air that the bidding for the grading of the streets in this city has not been as fair as it might have been, and that there has been a combination effected between the contractors, by means of which the property owners have been made to pay exorbitant prices for the improvements.
