NEWS NOTES.

A new Republican club was to have formed last night in the tent on the corner of Second and Fort streets, but the Republicans did not materialize to any great extent, and those who had called the meeting left at half-past eight o'clock. Mrs. Crosby, teacher and missionary from the Indian University, Muscogee, I. T., will address the Ladies' Missionary Society at the First Baptist Church, corner Sixth and Fort streets, this afternoon at 2 o'clock. All are cordially invited.

Criminal Notes.

S. H. Michell, charged with having disturbed the peace, was found not guilty by a jury before Justice Austin yesterday afternoon. John Nichols, who was charged with kicking a Negro out of his office a few days ago, was found guilty of battery yesterday by Justice King. Maggie Blair was arrested yesterday on complaint of her neighbor, Mrs. Hostong, who says that she disturbs the peace of the locality where she lives. Mrs. Mary King of Pasadena, who is accused by Deputy City Marshal John R. Slaton, of being insane, will be examined this afternoon at 2 o'clock by Judge Hutton. Mrs. Walker and Mrs. Anderson, charged by Mrs. Peterson with battery, were tried yesterday morning before Judge Cheney and found innocent. The quarrel was about chickens. Mrs. Merced Abbott and Amos Abbott were brought in Sunday for disturbing the peace. Yesterday they should have appeared before Justice King, and as they did not their bail was forfeited. James Harvey, the Texan who was accused of appropriating blankets which did not belong to him, was brought before Justice Austin yesterday afternoon, and in default of \$100 bail was committed for trial. Theodore Bauer, James Wood and B. Fenneman were sentenced by Justice King yesterday morning to pay a fine of \$25 a piece for disturbing the peace.

Notice of an appeal was given. These are the Republicans who were charged with snatching the ballot box at the Fourth Ward primary, and with breaking it open and throwing away the ballots.

Officer Sheets found J. L. Howe, John Dailey, P. J. Kyene and Mrs. Annie McDonald on San Fernando street in quite a state of hilarity last night. He arrested them and charged them with being drunk.

Arthur Weyermann, who is accused of having shot his brother a week ago, was arraigned before Justice King yesterday and will receive his examination this morning at 9 o'clock. He was admitted to bail of \$500.

Yesterday afternoon James Rodgers hitched his team on Buena Vista street and went into a saloon. When he came out he discovered Henry Berger fooling with the horse and promptly knocked him down. Sergeant Davis and Officer Hauley came up just in time to run them both in for disturbing the peace.

John Miller, it is alleged, found a vacant house on Spring street which suited his needs, and coolly took up his residence therein. The owner of the house, a Spring street merchant and an Englishman, went before Justice King yesterday and swore out a warrant for the man's arrest on the charge of forcibly entering a house.

Baseball Grounds.

The Los Angeles County Railroad Company is just completing the building of what will probably prove to be the most attractive baseball grounds in the State. The site selected is the Prospect Park on the "Nikolaus Priester" tract, and is just outside the city limits and on the main line of the Los Angeles County Railroad to Santa Monica. The buildings now in course of erection and fast nearing completion, consist of a grand stand, restaurant and refreshment rooms, bar, etc. The diamond is probably the finest in the State. The entire grounds, covering over ten acres, are fenced all round with a tight-board eight-foot fence. The grand opening will take place next Saturday.
