

THE RAILROADS.

What It Costs to Keep Engines Going.

EFFECT OF THE NEW RATES.

A New Line—Arrival of More Locomotives for the Southern Pacific.

The consumption of coal by a system like the Southern Pacific is, of course, enormous, but few people would imagine that 250 tons were taken from the bunks here daily by the trains coaling at this point. To accommodate this demand and with a view of preventing any possible running short during the coming winter, the Southern Pacific has been sending in coal in enormous quantities to San Pedro during the past three months, and has well stocked the stations up and down the line. At the present moment there are 45,000 tons at the yards on San Fernando street, 7,000 tons at Florence, 7,000 tons at Colton, 5,000 tons at Indio and 10,000 tons at Mojave and in addition to this, advices have been received of 10,000 tons more that are afloat and will be here shortly. The coal is brought in large quantities from England, Wales and Australia, as the Nanaimo and Wellington mines are quite unable to supply the demands of the company. The S. P. owns a mine at Carbon Hill, but the coal obtained from it is only sufficient to supply Oakland and the Northern California depots. All of the coal east of Sacramento is obtained from the Rocky Mountains, a good deal of wood being burned in the Nevada mountain divisions. The cost of keeping the smokestacks going is one of the principal items in the company's expense account as the coal costs on an average between \$8 and \$9 a ton. On Monday it was discovered that the coal in the San Fernando stacks, representing a cash value of about \$500,000, was on fire, this being the result of spontaneous combustion, the coal being frequently damp when it is stacked up. A hole was dug in to where the smoldering fire could be reached and with the application of plenty of water it was soon extinguished. Yesterday a report was sent up to Indio to the effect that the 7,000 tons there was on fire from the same cause, but it was put out before any damage was done.

THE NEW RATES.

How they Effect Chicago and Interior Points.

Nothing has been done by the railroads of late which so stirred up the Chicago merchants as the action of the transcontinental lines in adopting the new schedule of freight rates between New York and the Pacific Coast and Chicago and the same points. The rates on cotton piece goods yesterday from Chicago to San Francisco for first, second and third class goods were \$2.25, \$2 and \$1.45. The New York rates on the same articles were \$4.70, \$2.50 and \$2.80. The transcontinental schedule proposes to increase the Chicago rates to \$3.90 on all classes while leaving the New York rates at \$1.80. The same is done with soap articles. The imposed Chicago rate to San Francisco on that commodity is to be made \$1.80 per hundred, the rate remaining \$1.00 to New York. The merchants under this tariff can pay freight to New York on goods for California and then ship from there and gain about \$1.50 per hundred.

A NEW LINE.

Incorporation of the L. A. and Pacific R. R. Co.

The Los Angeles and Pacific R. R. Co. filed articles of incorporation yesterday with the County Clerk. The articles set forth that the road is to be standard gauge, and will start from a point in this city on the Los Angeles County Railroad, and run thence by the most practicable route to Pasadena, a distance of nine miles. It will also connect with the Los Angeles County Railroad at a point in this city, and run in a south-easterly direction to a point near the south-eastern corner of the city. Starting from a point on these lines in the city it will build to the Pacific Ocean, at or near Hueneme, in Ventura county, a distance of 60 miles. The capital stock is \$1,800,000, of which \$75,000 has been subscribed and \$75,000 paid in. The following are the directors: Cornelius Cole, Everett E. Hall, Richard C. Shaw, E. C. Burlingame, S. W. Luitweiler, James M. Hale and W. F. Spillman.

The Columbus Excursion.

Two special Pullman cars are to be sent down from Oakland for the use of visitors to the Columbus encampment, over the S. P. line, and will go right through to their destination without change. This is a great feature in railroading as it is not often that the same public cars take a 4000-mile trip. A number of tourist cars will also run through from this city. Judging by the quantity of tickets that are being sold, Los Angeles will be well represented at the Grand Army reunion, four cars being already chartered on the S. P.'s books.

More Engines.

The new engines for the Southern Pacific are coming in very fast. When the order was sent for 175 an arrangement was made by which 100 were to come over the Northern route and 75 via New Orleans and El Paso. Of these 75, two more, making 18 in all, passed through the city yesterday. Ten eight-wheel large cylinder passenger engines are expected in a few days and will be distributed at the leading points.

General Cleanings.

Mr. Dickson, coast agent of the St. Louis and San Francisco road, is in the city. Two thousand feet of sidetrack are being laid at Banning to accommodate the increased business there. Mr. Amos Burr, representative in this city of the Vanderbilt lines, has returned from a business trip in the lower country. A Burlington excursion over the northern route and a Phillips' excursion over the Santa Fe, will leave the city to-night. The Southern Pacific has laid planks

between its tracks all along the thoroughfares in this city so that vehicles can cross at any point.

The State Railroad Commissioners have examined the new rate sheets, and approve of those which affect the Los Angeles and Ventura divisions.

The Southern Pacific has temporarily suspended work on its Eastern San Joaquin line between Stockton and Poso. The track is laid below Porterville.

Twelve hundred Chinese are at work on the Port Costa double track. They only do the grading and tie-placing, the track-laying being left to 350 white men.


