What is Said of His Past Public Record.

THE CITY HALL ABORTION.

How He Voted to Sustain Ex-Chief McCarthy--A Friend of the Water Company.

Ever since the Republican City Convention selected for its nominee for Mayor Mr. D. E. Miles there have been heard on the streets rumors to the effect that Mr. Miles' past history in connection with this city, was not quite so clean as might have been desired, and that his champion, the Tribune, has abstained from saying much on this subject for fear that old memories might be raked up to lessen his chances for making a good run. There were a few, however, who had not forgotten he part took in the administration of the city's affairs and the stories of his positions on important questions which came up before the Council when he was its President were heard on every side yesterday.

MILES UPHOLDS BRIBERY. It will be remembered that he was President of the Council at the time a Chief of Police named McCarthy was placed on trial before the Council on charges of bribery and corruption and that it was through the efforts of himself, Dr. Sinsabaugh and Albert Brown that McCarthy was made the Chief. During the trial of McCarthy, sworn evidence was introduced in the Council to show that he had accepted bribes from the Chinese amounting to about \$900 per month and in the face of the most damaging evidence Mr. Miles voted in favor of McCarthy, and the reports in the newspapers at that time show that he talked for McCarthy and praised him for the manner in which he managed the affairs of the police. After the testimony had all been submitted Mr. Miles and his confederates passed a resolution exonerating McCarthy from the charge of bribery and corruption, but dismissing him on the ground of incompetency. So strong was public feeling against McCarthy that he left town immediately, and so did Councilman Brown; but Miles remained, and the part he took in the affair has not been forgotten.

THE CITY HALL ABORTION. The occupants of the present City Hall and those who have had a chance to examine it say that it is a monument to the memory of the care which Mr. D. E. Miles took of the interests of the city. The building of this was under the supervision of the committee of which Miles was a member, and of the Council at the time he was its President. No one who is familiar with its numerous cracks and with the generally bad manner in which it is built, denies that there must have been a job in it. It will be remembered that there was a time when it was thought to be in danger of falling down, and that it was so poorly constructed that prisoners could carve their way out with pieces of wood or tear the roof off with their hands. Escapes from its interior have been numerous and the only way prisoners can be kept in at present is by placing a guard over them. The sewer arrangements of the City Hall have been noted for their inadequateness and unhealthfulness, and to-day the City Clerk's office is one of the most unhealthy rooms in the city. It is only a short time since that it became necessary to make repairs to the sewers of the city prison, when it was discovered that they were about as good as none at all. A year ago the sewer matter from one cell bubbled up in the center of the floor of the one adjoining, and this trouble had existed from the very start. It is only a year ago that it was found that the building stood on no foundation to speak of. The excavation for the walls were found to have been only a foot or so below the surface of the ground and the material upon which the brick wall was placed was only a lot of cobblestones. When the discovery was made the explanation for the cracks in the walls was found, and it was Mr. Miles who was said to be responsible for the foisting upon the public of this fraud of a structure. At the time of the completion of the contract Mr. Miles was a member of the Council and his party was in power. There was an objection to the accepting of the building and a special building committee was appointed, of which Mr. Miles was a member and chairman. This committee was supposed to have examined into the work of the contractor, and it recommended that the work be accepted and the contractor paid. Those who are familiar with the matter express themselves as of the opinion that either Miles was a most inefficient and incompetent manager of the city's interest, or that he was amenable to reasons that no high-minded man could be moved by.

THE CITY LUMBER. The history of the disposal of lumber which had been bought for the street crossings of the city with the city's money, about the same time, is still fresh in the minds of many. The charge was made in the newspapers a couple of years ago that the Street Superintendent had been ordered to deliver this lumber to the houses of certain members of the Council. Mr. Miles was one of the Councilmen who received the wood, and it is said to be susceptible of proof that several loads of this wood was delivered at Mr. Miles' house, as well as at the houses of several of the Republican members of the Council. Indeed, this affair has permanently dry-docked, as far as availability for office is concerned, some of the parties who descended to so petty a malfeasance.

HE SHUFFLES IN HIGH LICENSE. Mr. Miles was in the Council when the present high rate of license was adopted, but he was opposed to the
