The assault with a deadly weapon charge against Dr. F. D. Buttolph came up in Justice Austin's court yesterday. Buttolph was the lively young man who came into the seat of a bell boy's trousers in the St. Elmo Hotel, when they were trying to get him to go to bed.

Messrs. William Pruette and Walter Allen, of the Abbott Opera Company, went hunting the other day at Florence for rabbits. They captured a good bag.

Mrs. Geo. Herrmann, wife of the popular Democrat, will arrive to-day from San Francisco, accompanied by her son and maid. Mr. Herrmann has engaged a handsome suite of rooms at the Hollenbeck and will permanently reside here.

Ben E. Ward, the jovial and dashing, has returned from his European tour, looking better than ever, and that is saying much. Ben confined his tour principally to the two great capitals—London and Paris.

NEWS NOTES.

There will be a fancy dress ball at the Raymond Hotel on New Year's eve. Three "vags" were sent up from Pomona yesterday to the County Jail.

Frank Brown, of San Pedro, who disturbed the peace, was sent up to the County Jail for ten days.

Rev. A. G. L. Trew, of San Gabriel, a native of Great Britain, has been made a citizen of the United States.

The various city officers are getting ready their annual reports. City Auditor Teed has one which will fill a big book.

The Board of Public Works will meet at 9 o'clock this morning, and the Fire Commissioners will meet this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The fare players of 265 1/2 South Main street appeared before Justice Austin yesterday, and their case was set for trial on January 2nd at 2 p. m.

Ah Chung was discovered by one of the police force yesterday in the act of trying to pawn a valuable lady's scarf pin and was arrested on suspicion.

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FROM NEAR AND FAR.

Foreign Flashes and Domestic Doings in Brief.

THE MAN KILLED IN THE PARK.

What the Teachers Did at Sacramento Yesterday—A Plucky Policeman—S. P. Taxes.

PHILADELPHIA, December 28.—What may prove a clue to the identity of the man found murdered in the Fairmount Park last Wednesday, was developed late this afternoon, when Mrs. Hooper, who keeps a boarding house in Hoboken, N. J., came to this city and recognized the body as being that of Geo. Kurtsman, who came to her house three weeks ago last Monday from Colorado and after remaining over night, left the following day to meet his wife who was expected to arrive on a Bremen steamer that day.

PHILADELPHIA, December 28.—The morning session of the State Teachers' Association, the discussion on Industrial Training was taken up, and C. J. Flatt, Vice-Principal of the State Normal School at Los Angeles, D. O. Hayes, Professor in the University of the Pacific, and others made a few remarks on the subject, after which a general discussion followed.

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CHICAGO, December 28.—Policeman Lake Burke, after being shot three times and fatally wounded, was taken to his assailant, Thomas Reynolds, a brickmaker, and brought him down with two bullets. One of Reynolds' shot's wounded a Mrs. Williams, but not seriously.

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SACRAMENTO, December 28.—The taxes of the Southern Pacific Company for 1888-89, amounting to \$521,679.70 were paid into the State Treasury to-day. It took the Treasury force several hours to count the money, which was contained in sacks of \$20,000 each.

LONDON, December 28.—Honora Prittle, sister of Lord Dunleavy, was killed to-day while hunting near Nenagh, County Tipperary. The horse stumbled and she fell from the saddle. Her feet becoming tangled in the stirrup she was dragged for some distance head downwards.

LONDON, December 28.—At 1:08 Edward Kane Height, 39 years old, a broker at 63 Cedar street, committed suicide by shooting himself over the right eye at his residence. The cause is excessive drink. Height is said to be a son of the United States Minister to Holland.

LONDON, December 28.—The Standard's correspondent at Zanzibar says: "Arabs from the interior report that the King has been deposed by his brother. If the report is true, Emin Pasha may be able to reach the coast."

LONDON, December 28.—Bright sat up in a chair last evening. He chatted cheerily and hopefully with friends, a fact which indicates a permanent change for the better.

PORT TOWNSEND, W. T., December 28.—Word comes here from Juneau, Alaska, that the steam schooner Leo was wrecked in the port of Houghton Harbor on November 27th, and was a total loss, including a small cargo of fur.

CHICAGO, December 28.—Mrs. Martin and Miss Kate Powers failed to notice the approach of a city-bound train as they were crossing the Rock Island tracks near Forty-seventh street this afternoon. The two were struck by the engine and thrown fifty feet—both were killed.

SAN FRANCISCO, December 28.—Henry Mueller died at Berkeley to-day from blood poisoning, caused by eating clams caught in the bay near the place where the Berkeley sewer empties into it. Others of the family are sick.
