

NEW CASES.

A Suit Growing Out of an Option on Rattlesnake Island.

J. P. Woodbury has filed a complaint in the Superior Court against L. R. Winans on two causes. First, he asks judgment against Winans on a promissory note for \$1,702.70 with interest from November 1, 1886. Second, he alleges to have Winans' written promise for \$7,500 with interest from March 31, 1886, and thereby hangs a tale that throws some light on the mysterious transactions regarding the sale and purchase of the coveted Rattlesnake Island property. The complaint recites that on the 31st of March last, W. O. King, J. P. Woodbury and L. R. Winans were the vendees and Asia Gwyn Dominguez and others the vendors mentioned in a certain contract for the sale and purchase of what is known as the Rattlesnake Island property; that on the date aforesaid Woodbury bought King's interest in said contract for \$15,000, for the joint use of Woodbury and Winans, the latter giving his note to the former for one-half the purchase money, payable in ninety days. Woodbury alleges that no part of the said amount has been paid, and suit is brought accordingly.

The Board of Supervisors met yesterday, all the members being present. The contract and specification for the paving of the jail yard were presented by the Bituminous Lime Rock Company and accepted.

On motion of Supervisor Venable the deed of Howard W. Mills et al., for road purposes, was accepted, and the highway from the north line of Denny's land to the intersection of Second street with the ten-mile road, was ordered abandoned.

The office of Constable of Orange township was declared vacant, Geo. Weitz, constable-elect, having failed to qualify, and Ross R. Birney was appointed in his stead. Supervisors Ross and Martin reported on the Anaheim and Fullerton bridge built by the California Bridge Company, that it was built according to plans and that specifications with the exception of the plank flooring does not reach the outside joints on the first, second and third spans; also that the joists do not in all cases, have sufficient bearing on the middle beams. The committee recommended that the company be re-

quired to correct the defects. The report was approved.

The Clerk was directed to advertise for ten days for bids for the construction of a bridge across the Santa Anita, at Falling Leaf avenue.

On motion of Supervisor Ross \$250 was ordered transferred from the General Road Fund to the New Hope District.

It was directed that upon a certain amount to be paid for the city of Compton for road purposes, it be placed to the order of the Board of Trustees of Compton.
