The Supervisors.

SATURDAY, January 12, 1889. The Board of Supervisors met yesterday, a full Board present. It was decided to appoint L. E. Demick as Deputy Recorder for the Assessor's office.

An opinion from the District Attorney to the effect that the county could not pay for the Justice courtrooms was placed on file. Deeds from F. Mohle and Mrs. Bradbeer for a strip of land for widening Washington street were accepted.

A petition for a new road to be called the Walnut road, was taken under advisement. The Chairman was appointed a committee of one to see about repairing the wall of the County Jail.

A petition from residents of Vineland asking that an irrigation district be formed was granted, and an election was ordered for February 8th.

A New S. P. Time-Card. A new time-card will go into effect on the Southern Pacific to-day. The only important change is as regards No. 19, which will make the trip between San Francisco and this city in one hour less time than heretofore, arriving here, however, at the same time, 7 P. M., as the train will leave the Bay City one hour later.

A slight change is also made in the Santa Barbara schedule, the afternoon train in future leaving at 4:50 instead of at 4:30.

CONTEMPT OF COURT.

Charges Against Messrs. Poirier and Smith. Messrs. Godfrey Poirier and A. S. White, of the Teahachapi Star Lime Company, were yesterday cited to appear in the United States Circuit Court to answer to a charge of contempt of court. The charge is that they committed contempt in procuring the issuance of a criminal process against H. M. Jacobs, R. Robert, August Pascal and John Nelson of Kern county, and Wm. Russell of San Francisco, for the purpose of having them brought to Los Angeles county so that they could be served with papers in a civil suit commenced in the Superior Court. It appears from statements made, that the parties alleged to be in contempt of court, desired to bring a civil suit against the parties named, and in order to do this the Sheriff was given the papers to serve. These parties were not in the county, and it is alleged that in order to bring them here Messrs. Poirier and A. S. White charged them with having cut timber on Government land. They were arrested and brought here and on their arrival on November 28, 1888, the suit was commenced against them in the Superior Court to recover \$6,000 for certain implements and stock which it was alleged they had appropriated. The Sheriff served them with copies of the complaint while they were being prosecuted criminally. It appears that under the United States law it is a contempt of court to serve parties to a civil suit while they are in attendance upon a criminal action in the United States court, and it is held to be an aggravated case when the criminal cases were commenced for the purpose of getting them inside of the county so that the Sheriff could serve the papers. Messrs. Poirier and Smith were called to appear before the Circuit Court on January 21st.

A Faithless Wife. In April last a man named Charles Robertson was arrested at Pomona and was convicted in August last of grand larceny for stealing a horse and wagon. He was sentenced to six months, and his term is about to expire. It is related that his wife taking advantage of his incarceration went to live with another man, who keeps a second-hand clothing store on Second street, and even paid a lawyer to drop proceedings to secure his release. Robertson heard of the faithlessness of his wife, and vowed vengeance when he is released. The person who won his wife became aware of his threats and has gone to another town, leaving the faithless wife to follow later.


