PERSONAL.

A SUDDEN DEATH.

Colonel R. C. Flournoy Dies at His Residence. A well-known citizen of Los Angeles, Colonel Robert C. Flournoy, died at his residence on Hill street yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock.

Colonel Flournoy came to Los Angeles seven years ago from Louisville, Kentucky. He was a native of Bourbon county, Kentucky, and made his way out to California before the war broke out. When the news of the rebellion came to the Coast, as his sympathies were with the Confederate cause he returned to his native State and was put in command of a regiment.

The funeral will take place at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning at the residence of the family, 1106 Hill street. His death will be mourned by a large number of steadfast friends.
