NEWS NOTES.

The United States Grand Jury was in session yesterday, and adjourned until Friday.

Mr. Frank Maynes has gone out of the Nadeau hotel management, having sold his interest to Mr. Chase, one of his partners.

The new Police Commissioner, Mr. T. A. Lewis, was sworn in yesterday morning by the City Clerk and received his certificate of election.

The Police Commission will meet this afternoon at 2 o'clock, and the Fire Commission at 10 o'clock this morning in Mayor Hazard's office.

The people of the Third Congregational church tender their pastor, Rev. J. H. Collins, a reception tonight in the church building, corner of Main and Railroad streets.

Transfers of real estate yesterday amounted to \$59,534, and were 38 in

number. Of these 12 were for more than \$1,000 each, and 15 were for nominal considerations.

The case of the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company against the San Diego Street-Car Company was yesterday referred to the Master in Chancery to take testimony and make return of findings to the United States District Court.

The concert to have been given this evening at the Woman's Home has been postponed on account of the weather. The tickets sold will be good for the entertainment at a later date, but the money will be refunded to any who desire it.

There will be a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce this afternoon. They will confer with H. M. LaRue, of the State Board of Agriculture, on matters relative to the citrus fair which will be held here next spring.

Constable Clements is being sued by Captain Haley for \$2,000 damages, for unlawful detention of goods. Clements, in his official capacity, seized a lot of fruit driers and stuff, supposed to be the property of H. L. Goltzman, but Haley claims the stuff.

The property owners along the line of the Second-street cable road are expected out in force at the meeting of the West End Board of Trade this evening. The Sewer, Light and Gas, Street and School Committees are expected to give full reports.

The only place on Fort street, between First and Sixth, where there are no sidewalks on the east side of the street is in front of the City Hall near Second street. The Street Superintendent was instructed about a month ago to construct this sidewalk, but the delay in fixing the grounds has, it is said, caused the delay in building the sidewalk, and the consequence is that pedestrians have to walk in the gutter to reach the City Hall from Second street.

AN EXPLODED BUBBLE.

Stories of Outrages at Jefferson Barracks not Sustained. WASHINGTON, October 22.—The report of the court of inquiry which investigated the charges regarding the treatment of recruits at Jefferson barracks, Mo., has been laid before the Secretary of War. The testimony showed that the charges made were exaggerated, but there was some foundation for part of them. It was found that the food given the men was badly cooked and poorly served. The rations were ample and the supply of vegetables abundant. The charges that non-commissioned officers were running games of chance and getting part of the monthly wages of the men were sustained. Only one case of what might be termed harsh treatment by non-commissioned officers was discovered, and this branch of the allegation practically fell through. The statements of a reporter who enlisted and wrote up the matter were found reliable so far as they concerned matters within his knowledge, but the stories told him by other enlisted men cannot be substantiated. Many of these stories were traditions which had been handed down for years from one recruit to another. Desertions from Jefferson barracks exceed those at other posts, but the report says this is traceable to the fact that the post is in the West, near a large city, and the force is composed of cavalry recruits. Many men enlist in the East for no other purpose than to get West, while many enter the army from restlessness or because of family troubles. These men become weary of discipline and desert, and the number increases with the proximity of the post to a large city, where they can hide.

Desertion is also due largely to the fact that many of the recruits are "repairers," or chronic deserters, who, having been served in the artillery or infantry, enlist in the cavalry, knowing that the probabilities are strongly against their meeting at Jefferson barracks, the officers under whom they had previously served. Captain Ebstein thinks the result of the investigation will be decidedly beneficial, and will result in righting many grievances which have gradually crept into the service.

THE ENGINEERS' COUNCIL.

DENVER, October 22.—At yesterday afternoon's session of the Convention of Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, it is understood that the Grievance Committee concluded its work. Most of the cases were referred back to the various divisions for final settlement. A number of the lodges suspended during the Missouri Pacific strike were restored in good standing with the Brotherhood. Among the lodges reinstated is that of St. Louis. Today was the time set for the election of officers, but instead of this the time was entirely taken up with trying one of the grand officers, against whom serious charges have been preferred. Rumor has it that Chief Arthur is the man on trial, though when questioned upon this point nearly all the delegates were non-committal. This investigation will not be concluded till tomorrow.

CHRISTIAN MISSIONS.

LOUISVILLE, October 22.—The National Missionary Convention of the Christian Campbellite church is in session here. Three boards are represented—Foreign, Home and Woman's. The Woman's Board began its fifteenth annual convention this morning, Mrs. Jamison, of Indianapolis, delivering the annual address. The year's efforts have been directed toward the West, and especially Montana, where a number of churches have been planted.

SPORTING NOTES.

The Southern California Athletic Club is determined to give its protégé, Joe Ellingsworth, a chance to redeem his laurels under its auspices, and since his defeat by Danny Kelleher on the 20th of August last, several attempts have been made to match him. For various reasons these attempts have proved futile, but it was rumored last night that the club had at last met with success. It is stated that the club has received an acceptance from Gen O'Reardon, of San Francisco, to meet Joe Ellingsworth in a few weeks at 150 pounds for a purse of \$1,000.

The McCoy-Cuffe fight, which has been postponed from Thursday next until the 31st instant, should prove a drawing card in the hands of the Southern California Athletic Club. Though it was reported that Cuffe had sprained his ankle while training, very little credence was given to the announcement by members of the local sporting fraternity. Both men are in excellent trim, and are said to be hard as nails, and there is every probability that the mill will be an interesting one from start to finish.
