THURSDAY, DECEMBER 26TH.

The Board of Police Commissioners held its weekly session yesterday afternoon in the Mayor's office, President Hazard in the chair, and Messrs. Collins, Dexter, Knox and Lewis present.

In order to curtail the meeting as much as possible, the usual reading of the minutes was dispensed with, and the saloon business taken up.

The petition of Ashley & Halbritter for a new saloon at No. 133 South Spring street was returned by the Chief with the announcement that the applicants had decided not to go into the business at present, whereupon it was ordered placed on file.

The following petitions for transfers of licenses were granted: Kerr & Schwartz from Kerr & Willard, for the saloon at 201 East First street; Bailey & O'Mara from Dean & Ferree, for saloon at No. 13 West First street; Schade & Oranz from Gus Schade, for saloon at No. 400 South Spring street; G. W. Miller from Canfield & Munson, for Caledon saloon, at No. 155 South Spring street. Munson sent in a protest against the granting of this application until after the board had made an investigation, but as the applicant's affidavit showed that a bona fide sale had been made, and it appeared that Munson refused his consent to the transfer on account of a debt, the protest was ignored and filed.

The application of the Klein Bros. for a new saloon at No. 2 North Main was referred to the Chief for investigation under the rules.

Chief Glass submitted his annual report of all houses of prostitution, resorts of thieves, second-hand dealers, pawnbrokers, lodging houses and hotels, in accordance with rule 122 of the police regulations, which was received and placed on file.

The report stated that there were 133 houses of prostitution, of which only twelve contained more than one inmate. These houses were rented for the purpose by sixteen property owners, whose names appear with the houses owned by them. Fourteen gambling resorts, exclusive of the rooms in the rear of cigar stores where draw-poker is played, are reported, with the foot-note that "not a single game of faro has been dealt for the past three months." Thirteen pawnbrokers, of whom four are Chinese, appear on the list, with remarks as to their character. Thirty-four second-hand dealers, including eight fences, are reported; and all the hotels and lodging houses, ranging from "first-class" to "houses of assignation," are commented upon.

A number of demands, amounting in the aggregate to \$326.35, were approved as read.

The application of Frank E. Lewis for a position on the force was received and placed on file.

Chief Glass reported that the Electric Light Company had presented Officer Collins with a reward of \$5 for arresting bill-stickers who had defaced one of its poles a short time ago. The money was turned over to Clerk Robinson, who was instructed to pay it into the police reward fund of the city treasury.

Mr. Lewis stated that in view of the approaching winter race meeting, which commenced on the 25th inst., he had been asked to bring the matter of putting up large signs advertising the same opposite the Nadeau, at the Plaza and on the corner of Ninth street. The matter was referred to the Chief, with power to act.

The same Commissioner said that he had seen several officers in uniform coming out of saloons with politicians and other prominent persons, and he thought that the practice of drinking while on duty ought to be suppressed with a strong hand. After a short discussion, Mr. Knox moved to amend rule 5 of the Police Regulations, so as to read as follows:

"No member of the force wearing his uniform shall smoke while on the street, except from 1 to 5 a. m., nor in public places, nor enter any saloon, or place where liquor is sold, except when in pursuit of his duty, nor drink any intoxicating liquor, nor engage in any game of cards or billiards in any public place. All members of the force who have either their helmet, blouse, dress coat or overcoat on, will be considered under this rule to be in uniform."

Chief Glass reported that the Council had bought a new horse for the patrol wagon, and that he had turned over the old horse to that body to be sold.

He further reported that Captain Lockwood, of the chain gang, was incapacitated for duty, owing to having been severely burned at his residence a few days ago, and that he had placed Officer Hawley in charge of the prisoners. As Lockwood was not a member of the force, this made the department a man short, and he asked that a special officer be appointed to the duty, so as to relieve Hawley and allow him to return to his

beat. Mayor Hazard suggested that as every department was running behind just now, the matter be allowed to stand for the present, and no further action was taken.

The board then adjourned.

A small fire was started in the gymnasium of the Congregational church Tuesday night, through an overturned lamp, caused by the antics of one of the patrons of that institution. It was speedily brought under control, however.

There will be a dance on Monday evening in Campbell's hall, given by Los Angeles Legion No. 6, Seaside Knights.

The exhibition of views by Rev. W. W. Tinker, announced for last Monday night, was postponed, owing to the non-arrival of the gas for the stereopticon.

A pair of horses next week in the pound which belong to Mr. Clark or Mr. Lovell, yet both parties refuse to be considered owners. Clark sold the team to Lovell some time since, taking a promissory note in payment. Later Lovell desired to return them, but Clark refused to receive them when Lovell tied them up in the vicinity and left them. The poor animals remained for twenty-four hours without food or water, when the neighbors interfered and turned the animals loose, when an officer led them off to the pound as strays.
