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NEWS ABOUT TOWN.

The Court-Martial Still in Progress.

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. The Ladies Organize to Aid in Making a Great Exhibit-Other Items of Interest.

THE RAILROADS. Rumors About the Los Angeles and Pacific.

The Los Angeles and Pacific road is occupying the attention of the circle of railroad rumors in these days.

The court-martial on the case of Col. W. H. H. Russell continued its session through the day and evening yesterday.

The prosecution closed what appears to the spectators to be a very strong case, and the defense put on several witnesses.

At the morning session Lieutenant McPherson's cross-examination was completed, and Brigadier-General Johnson took the stand and testified with regard to an order for an inspection which had not been obeyed by Colonel Russell.

Lieutenant Worth and Captain H. Z. Osborne gave testimony on various points connected with Colonel Russell's peculiar system of keeping accounts, and Sergeant Laet explained how the affairs of the Eagle Corps were conducted.

John L. Hickman, expert accountant, was called to testify to the showing made by the books in which Colonel Russell had the accounts of the Eagle Corps.

He testified that he found a discrepancy of over \$5,000 between the accounts and the vouchers. According to Mr. Hickman's calculation the finances of the Eagle Corps were kept in a very unbusiness-like sort of style.

W. C. Stone, the financial secretary of the Eagle Corps, was down on the list of the defendant's witnesses, but he was summoned by the prosecution and ordered to produce and explain all his books and the entries therein.

The principal book was one in which the accounts ran from November, 1886, to May, 1889. The witness would not swear that it had been in his possession prior to 1889.

It bore pretty good external evidence of having all been written at about the same time. The ink in which the 1886 entries were made was just as clear as that of the entries of 1889.

The prosecution will endeavor to show that the accounts were cooked up for the purpose of hiding irregularities in Colonel Russell's financial affairs.

In the evening session Colonel Russell was placed on the stand as the first witness for the defense.

He explained the way in which he kept his books. He went over the items of expense for which there were no receipts or vouchers and told what the outlay was for.

The court finally adjourned at about 10 o'clock, and will convene again this morning at 9, when the cross-examination of Colonel Russell will begin.

Messrs. Wade and Hynes of the Santa Fe will probably return from Colorado today.

C. S. Mellon the general traffic manager of the Union Pacific, who has been representing his line at the Transcontinental Association, received word that his wife was seriously ill in San Francisco and went north yesterday on a special train provided for him by the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific.

A Santa Fe excursion will leave for the East today. Clarence Clark of the Norfolk and Western Railway, is at the Raymond.

H. H. Houston, a director of the Pennsylvania railroad, arrived in the city day before yesterday and departed yesterday in his special car for San Diego.

"RICHARD III." Frederick Warde's Production at the Grand Opera House.

Yesterday afternoon Frederick Warde, assisted by his thoroughly well-selected company, produced *Richard III.* before a very fair audience for so wet a day.

In the evening the play was *Richard III.* and the production was very highly wrought. The costuming is on a magnificent scale, but it was carried to a point a little too far, for even "Richard" was clad in a fine suit of mail, epic and span new, whereas that leader of a most forlorn hope, when he came to the throne as Richard III was a beggar.

Mr. Warde's "Richard III" is so well known to the play-goers of the city that analysis were superfluous. He has improved in much of the declamation end of the business since here, and the recognition his art won last night from a most densely crowded, intelligent and enthusiastic house must have been flattering to the recipient. Mr. Warde is a great favorite with Los Angeles people, who will be glad to see him return here soon.

"A Hole in the Ground." Hoyt's *Hole in the Ground* will commence a three nights' engagement at the Grand opera house this evening, giving during their engagement a Saturday matinee. The attraction is said to be extremely fine, and the company first-class in every respect.

Many of the original cast are still with the company. Judging from the advance sales the attendance will be very large.

Minor Notes from the Courts. The case of Benoit Renault, fully reported in the *HERALD* yesterday, was argued and taken under advisement by Judge McKinley yesterday.

Pending the decision the prisoner was remanded. Chas. Segglio, a native of Italy, was made a citizen.

The San Pedro sailors who kidnaped the men from the bark *Sundborg*, were before Department 6 on a writ of habeas corpus. A decision had not been reached when the court adjourned.

D. S. A. Hazen was rearrested yesterday and charged with being insane. C. F. Kuhl secured a divorce from his wife, Lizzie D. Kuhl, Judge McKinley granting the decree. He alleges that his wife goes away from her home to dances such as she should not attend.
