VEGETABLES IN THE EAST.

ASSISTANT FREIGHT AGENT WHITE-MORE GIVES SOME POINTERS.

Valuable Information Given in His Letter to the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

Secretary Willard yesterday received a letter of some length from J. A. Whitmore, assistant general freight agent of the Santa Fe route, in regard to a possible winter market in the east for California vegetables.

Mr. Whitmore says that owing to the large number of queries received daily by his office, the chamber of commerce and various shipping places he has ascertained from several eastern cities the prospects of California vegetables for this winter. A few quotations are also appended.

In Denver the merchants and commission men anticipate a lively season for California vegetables. Greenly potatoes are selling for \$1.22 f. o. b. at Denver with an increase in the market.

Onions are going at \$1.25. The delivery is from growers in that section, but the merchants will be ready for first-class stock as soon as it may be ready for shipment.

At Kansas City the cabbages that are on the market were shipped from points in California and are bringing 65 cents per 100 pounds f. o. b. at California.

The present price of potatoes is \$1, but these, of course, are old and have been shipped from the north. Onions are worth \$1 to \$1.50.

Everything is looking favorable in Chicago for a good market for California potatoes. The Wisconsin and Michigan products are now selling for \$0 and \$0.50 cents. This has been an exceptionally severe winter there and it is probable that the growers' cellars, which have previously been frost proof, have been so badly damaged that they are unable to protect the goods stored in them.

A few home cabbages have been grown, but the supply for the spring and summer trade will be entirely dependent upon California and the south. California cauliflower will command a good market, as they are almost perfect.

Owing to the cold weather the merchants could not exhibit products to the first few buyers who ventured out, and there will be a good sale for all kinds of vegetables within the next 30 days.

Added to the communication is a copy of a circular relating to the eastern market for California vegetables, and the best manner of shipping them. The circular was gotten out by the chamber of commerce last year. It states that the trade in these commodities commences February 1st and continues until April 30th.

Heretofore they have been shipped from the Bermuda islands, but lately have been coming from Cuba. By means of the fast freight refrigerator car services from the east the local products are landed in Chicago comparatively fresh, thus obtaining an immense advantage over the foreign shipments, which occupy a much longer time in being delivered and run greater risks in being often transferred.

Judgment, however, must be used in the selection of the character of the seed, a lack of which, as has been previously explained, is the reason that Southern California products have been unable to compete with the southern supply.

TRANS-MISSISSIPPI CONGRESS. Some Features of the Ogdin Meeting in April.

The time for holding the Trans-Mississippi congress has been changed from May 2d to Monday, April 24th.

The congress adjourned at New Orleans to meet again at Ogdin May 2d, but this date conflicts with the world's fair opening, and Governor Prince of New Mexico, president of the congress, and the executive committee, have changed the date to Monday, April 24th.

All of the governors of the 22 trans-Mississippi states are expected to be at the congress at Ogdin, and under the change of date will be able to get through with the congress at Ogdin and travel together to Chicago and take part in the ceremonies at the opening of the world's fair.

No event in the history of the west has ever occurred before to bring together so many of its governors, and this feature alone will make it a notable occasion.

WHISPERING WILLIE.

HE DECLINES TO FIGHT SAN PEDRO'S IMPROVEMENT.

His Letter to the San Diego Council Gives the Los Angelesphobists Some Good Advice and Tells Them Some Plain Truths.

Whispering Willie Bowers, the San Diego congressman, whatever else he may be, is not easily bulldozed.
