The Science People to Visit Prof. Lowe at Pasadena.

Santa Ana the Scene of a Notable Horse Sale.

Second Shipping Notes—Redlands Local Affairs—Lordsburg Matters.

PASADENA, Feb. 17.—In response to an invitation from Prof. and Mrs. T. S. C. Lowe the members of the Southern California Science association will visit Pasadena in a body, tomorrow, for the purpose of inspecting the collection of interesting objects belonging to the professor and wife.

Members of the society are requested to meet at the Terminal First street station and take the 1:25 train for Pasadena, getting off at the California street station and going directly to the professor's residence on South Orange Grove avenue.

This collection is well worthy a careful inspection, being the result of almost a lifetime's work in bringing it together from almost every portion of the globe. It includes curios from New Mexico, England, Alaska, the South Sea Islands, Egypt, the Holy Land, India and China, and has for the most part been gathered by Mrs. Lowe during her extensive travels in those countries.

The mineral department is very interesting, containing a very complete and beautiful collection of almost all known minerals.

The collection of Indian baskets is pronounced by competent judges to be the largest in existence without exception, covering every portion of this interesting work.

Perhaps the most interesting object of the whole collection is the porcelain tea service, formerly the property of General Lafayette, valued at \$5000.

A collection of chinaware of the time of Louis XVI, bearing portraits of the reigning sovereigns of that period, and members of the royal family, would alone well repay a visit to this interesting private museum.

Disatisfaction With the Irrigation District's Management.

LORDSBURG, Feb. 17.—Something like two years ago the Orange Belt Irrigation district was organized in accordance with the Wright act. Bonds were voted, some of them sold and taxes have been assessed and collected now for two years. Lordsburg and vicinity are embraced in this district. There is quite a dissatisfaction prevalent with our people relative to the manner the said district seems to have been managed. No water for acreage and but little prospect there will be any in the near future. The business office is outside the district, the advertising of delinquent taxes and other matters have all been published in papers outside the district, while there are several weeklies within the district. The people around here are indignant the way matters seem to be going, and if the act now pending in the legislature, the purport of which is to give dissatisfied districts an opportunity to disincorporate, becomes a law, the fate of the O. B. I. D. is sealed.

The Scene of a Notable Horse Sale.

SANTA ANA, Feb. 17.—The air was full of horse talk yesterday in this city, for horsemen were here from all parts of Southern California, to attend the auction sale of standard-bred horses at the Plaza ranch. The sale was not a success, for the horses were in very bad condition and bidding was light. However, Mr. Willets has decided to hold these sales annually, at a more opportune season.

It was announced yesterday that Silkwood, the great pacer, would again be put into training and on for a record this year. Knowing ones in this county always had serious doubts that the black beauty was to go into retirement, and so the announcement did not create any surprise. It is safe enough to say that the horse will not only be driven for a record but will also be seen in races during the coming campaign.

A much is expected at the races here next season. Many enthusiasts are urging that the Orange County Fair association give a three days' spring race meeting. There is little doubt but that such a meeting could be successfully held in this city, for with the number of race horses now in the county we could hold a pretty fair meeting should no outside horses enter.

He is the son of Silkwood, 2:07 1/2, and his dam is Ricetta, the great race mare, now in Los Angeles. Their efforts were rewarded by gathering in about six tons of ore valued at \$20,000.


