THE GOVERNMENT CIRCUMVENTED.
The time for the registration of Chinese will expire tomorrow. Not one in a hundred—nay, not one in a thousand—has complied with the law.

The Geary law plainly provides that all Chinese shall register, and with the certificate in their possession they would have the evidence of their right to remain in the country.

But will the government have the nerve to carry out what the law makes it plain duty to do? No one believes it will. The same spirit of forbearance and of deference to the defiant attitude of the Chinese will operate to make the government hesitate to forcibly extrude the several hundred thousand Chinese who have defied registration.

All this honeyfugling and temporizing on the part of our government will confirm the wily Chinese in their ability to circumvent any law we may enact against their coming here.

But now, after all this legislation, culminating in an act to make exclusion effective, we are to be treated with another huge failure. Chinese cunning and presumption have proved too much for us, and it is no wonder that they hold us and our laws in contempt.

The government at Washington may rule Americans; but the Chinese six companies rule their own people in defiance of all we may do to the contrary.
