The means by which the identification is attained, the solicitor-general contended, was lawful and reasonable and humane in its provisions.

In conclusion the solicitor-general said: "Assuming the maxim that the safety of the people is the supreme law, then police power in relation to every subject of danger must, under our system, rest either in the states or the United States or the people. If it is assumed that Chinese alien labor is a public danger threatening the safety of the people, then the power to cope with it rests somewhere, if not in the United States, then in states or people of the United States. If the latter, it occurs to me the Chinese residents of this country have need to repeat the old prayer that they may be saved from their friends or countrymen, for if they can induce the courts to hold that the power does not belong to the federal government, but rests in the people of the several states, no person can doubt that the states will promptly rid themselves of the hateful presence by appropriate legislation. The states which the Chinese would then be worse than now, for while the act under consideration seeks only to prevent the perpetration of frauds upon the government any action of the people of a state must directly affect the welfare of the state, and probably be drastic in its character, with the purpose not of protecting the government and duly accredited Chinese, but expelling entirely from their domain the obnoxious race."

HOKE SMITH DISSENTS. He thinks Troops Should Be Retained at Fort DuChesne. WASHINGTON, May 10.—Secretary Hoke Smith received a communication from the secretary of war transmitting the recommendation of General Schofield, in which he concurs that Fort DuChesne, Utah territory, be abandoned in order that the troops stationed there may be withdrawn and with those at other remote stations concentrated at new posts constructed for them.

An Interesting Land Suit. PITTSBURG, May 10.—The claim to 165 acres of land near Homestead will more than likely be soon tested in the courts of Allegheny county. The claimants are the heirs of Christian Johanssen and the claim has been pending for forty years. Part of the property is that upon which the works of the Carnegie Steel company are erected, and the remainder includes a large part of Homestead. Two ladies from Sioux City, who refused to reveal their names, are in the city to secure evidence to push the case.

Electric Conspiracy Cases. PITTSBURG, May 10.—In the great electric conspiracy cases, in which the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company alleges a number of officers of the General Electric company conspired with certain people to obtain plans and blue prints of the Westinghouse people, all the defendants waived examination this afternoon in Alderman McMasters' offices, and the cases will go to court in June.

Dixon's Money Returned. BOSTON, May 10.—Jimmy Ormond, who was agreed upon by Dixon and Griffin to hold the \$10,000 side bet, returned to Tim O'Rourke today the \$5000 forfeit he posted in his hands last week, because he said he is satisfied the backers of Griffin have no intention of covering it.

Admiral Lono Is Dead. HAWAII, May 10.—Admiral Gomez E. LONO, who commanded the Spanish vessels of war in the recent naval review in New York harbor, and who was prevented by ill-health from reviewing the land parade and came here later in the flagship, is dead.

Booth Relapsing. New York, May 10.—Edwin Booth's condition is believed to be more serious this evening. His doctors held a long consultation this afternoon and afterward issued an unfavorable bulletin.

An Archduke Injured. BRUDA-PRESTI, May 10.—Archduke Eugene was thrown from his horse today and badly hurt. His injuries are not regarded as fatal.

REPUBLICAN GRAND MOGULS, Tom Carter Re-elected National Chairman.

Joseph H. Manley of Maine Honored With the Secretaryship.

President Clarkson Calls the National League of Republican Clubs to Order and Delivers His Address.

By the Associated Press. LOUISVILLE, May 10.—The national Republican committee met here today elected Thomas H. Carter chairman and Joseph H. Manley secretary, according to the programme made up at the caucus last night, and after a four hours' session the committee adjourned.

In accordance with the caucus programme the meeting was called to order by Carter, and he immediately surrendered the gavel to De Young, vice-chairman, and withdrew from the meeting. Resolutions declaring Carter to be permanent chairman of the Republican national committee were unanimously adopted, and Carter was called back and once more assumed the duties of chairman. Joseph H. Manley of Maine was then elected secretary.

A long and rather heated discussion was caused by a resolution offered by Payne of Milwaukee that the basis of representation in the national convention be fixed at four delegates at large for each state and one additional delegate for each 7000 votes, or a majority fraction thereof, cast in each state for the Republican electoral ticket at the election of 1892, and each territory and the District of Columbia be entitled to two delegates, provided no congressional district shall have less than one delegate. The resolution was tabled by a vote of 18 to 10, but provided that the resolution be discussed at the regular meeting of the committee.

A resolution providing no debt should be incurred by the committee unless authorized by a vote of the executive committee at a meeting duly called, was adopted.

The committee on time and place of next meeting agreed upon Denver and the second Wednesday in May, but the decision remains to be ratified by the convention tomorrow.

The galleries of McCauley's theater were crowded long before the national League of Republican Clubs assembled, and the audience including many of Louisville's famous beauties.

When all the delegates were seated the convention was called to order by President J. S. Clarkson.

The appearance of Mrs. J. Ellen Foster of Iowa on the stage was greeted with a storm of applause. Mayor Tyler welcomed the delegation on behalf of the city.

Col. D. L. Crawford, president of the Kentucky state league, welcomed the visitors on behalf of the state. In the course of his remarks he referred to the fact that there are over 1000 Republicans in the state who voted for Abraham Lincoln. At the mention of Lincoln's name the entire audience of delegates and on-lookers arose and cheered enthusiastically.

The league was also welcomed on behalf of the state by A. E. Wilson.

Wilson presented President Clarkson a gavel of 10 kinds of Kentucky wood. When Clarkson arose to respond to the gift he was met with a storm of applause. He had been quite ill yesterday, and it was feared for a time he would not be able to attend the convention today.

Thirty-three states responded to the roll call, then President Clarkson delivered his annual address.

Dr. Henry B. Blackwell of Boston submitted the following: Whereas, Political justice, impartial liberty and equal rights for all are the foundation principles of the Republican Party, and whereas, All persons, born or naturalized in the United States and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the states in which they reside; therefore,

Resolved, That we reaffirm our national platform of 1872 and 1892. The Republican party is mindful of its obligations to the loyal women of America for their noble devotion to the cause of freedom. Their admission to wider spheres of usefulness is viewed with satisfaction, and we demand the ballot for every citizen of the United States, north and south, irrespective of race, color or sex.

When the clerk had finished reading there was loud applause. A delegate from Montana cried for three cheers, and they were given with great vehemence. The resolution was then referred to the committee on resolutions. Adjourned until tomorrow morning.

New York, May 10.—An argument was heard today before Judge Cowing in the court of general sessions in the libel suit of Edward S. Stokes, of the Hoffman house, against W. E. D. Stokes and Lawyer William R. Martin. Ex-Mayor George J. Gould has been elected president of the Missouri Pacific and the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern railroads.

The French chamber of deputies has passed a bill raising the French legation in Washington to the rank of an embassy.

Thomas Nelson Page, the well-known Southern novelist, will be married June 8th at Elkhart, Ill., to the widow of the late Henry Field of Chicago.

The board of review of the National Training association has refused the application for the reinstatement of the famous grey stallion Aleron.

Gas Thomasstown, Cornelius Wagner and Andrew Olson, workmen, became confused by rapidly moving trains at Grand crossing, Chicago, and were run over and killed.

The Indiana bituminous miners and operators have come to an agreement, after weeks of negotiations, and there will be no strike. The scale as signed is the same as last year.

The British house of commons, in committee on the home rule bill, rejected a motion that the portion of the bill providing for a second chamber of the Irish legislature be eliminated, by a vote of 295 to 244.

William Deering & Co., paper manufacturers, of Chicago, have attached property the National Cordage company, in possession of the Kansas City branch, to secure a debt of \$100,000.

The village of North Galveston, Ind., was almost totally destroyed by fire on Tuesday. J. J. Jackson, wife, two sons and daughter perished in the flames. Several other persons were badly burned. Many families lost their entire earthly possessions. The total loss is \$75,000.

During a performance at a theater in Lemberg, Austrian Galicia, Herr Delozuka, one of the actors in a fit of jealous rage, because a member of the company, a young woman of whom he was deeply enamored, insisted on flirting with men in the audience, drew a revolver and shot himself dead in full view of the audience.

The stockholders of the Big Four railroad have decided to issue \$50,000,000 mortgage bonds; \$5,000,000 for double tracking and equipment; \$20,000,000 to retire outstanding bonds; \$16,000,000 to be used after 1894, at the rate of \$1,000,000 per year, for equipment and construction. Authority is also given the directors to extend the line to Louisville, Ky.
