THE RECLAMATION OF THE NORTHWEST PART OF YUMA COUNTY.
H. R. Leonard, the architect and civil engineer of this city, says the Phoenix, A. T. Republican, is fitting up an outfit to make explorations in the northwest part of Yuma county, with a view of reclaiming 350,000 acres of arid land in the vicinity of Palomas mountains, and south of the Bill Williams fork of the Colorado river.

The vast plains west of Palomas mountains and near the Colorado Indian reservation are fertile, only needing water, which can be easily abstracted from Ben Williams's fork. The plan is to construct a dam and build a reservoir 15 miles long and two miles wide, which can be done, according to a preliminary survey of the situation, at a cost of \$375,000. From this point it will be conducted by canals, one running southward, and the other south-east, watering plains on either side of this short range of mountains and passing as far east as the Granite range. Hence, the plains, between these two ranges, through which runs Granite wash, the oldest placer grounds known in the United States, having been worked extensively for more than 300 years. As there is no water in that vicinity, dry wash processes or screening have been the only feasible means of working, but even by this process long sacks of precious nuggets and dust are brought out yearly.

Some think this was one of the Aztec diggings in the days of Montezuma, but sufficient evidence is not at hand to substantiate the fact. One thing, however, is certain, this is an ancient gold field, but lack of water has kept it in the back ground. Many old prospectors have fished for water in this locality, and but one year in a great number of wells sufficient water for even a few months' work.

Port Los Angeles.
The American Contractor of Chicago, of May 6th, contains the following:
The rapid growth of Southern California as evidenced by the enormous increase in the commercial shipments during the past few years are drawing the attention of many eastern manufacturers and others thitherward. Especially since the Southern Pacific railway has commenced its war on freight rates—a matter always interesting to the shippers.

The magnificent wharf which this road has been constructing at Santa Monica, and the interest which the government at Washington is exhibiting in a new deep water harbor for Southern California also indicate the general feeling that this part of the coast is becoming of more importance than it has been to the rest of the country.

The name of the new wharf has been changed to Port Los Angeles in view of a proposition that it will be made a port of entry for Los Angeles. In fact, a petition to congress to have it so declared officially in accordance with the act of congress of March 31, 1892, has been signed by the leading wholesale merchants and shippers of Los Angeles, representing the bulk of all the jobbers. The chief claims presented are that this is the nearest available point to Los Angeles, there being at least an hour's difference in freight schedule time from this point and its next nearest rival. Also being further north it is much more convenient in all coastwise business, steamers from the north landing here first and leaving here last on their return, a fact fully appreciated by the jobbers, as it often saves an entire commercial day.

West Los Angeles is now a port so far as certain heavy shipments are concerned, such as coal, cement, lumber and a few other articles. However, the big wharf is not yet complete, the coal bunkers are being built, the company proposes to build, on the south side of the wharf, a railroad-way extending 3000 feet out, and 2500 feet to a boat landing. For promenade, fishers, etc., this will be a gala affair and thoroughly utilized. Located on the site to be erected a large terraced pavilion between the beach and the bluff—a four story structure, the first story to contain fine large bath rooms, the second story promenade, band pavilion, etc., and the upper stories as viewing stands or chambers for the guests. In fact, the recent improvements made and the many planned, all of most substantial character, indicate the faith in its future importance.

THE SIX COMPANIES.
The Chinese Trust Which Controls All Emigrants.

The Six Companies about which so much talk is going on just now on account of the agitation of the Chinese question, is an organization that very few people know anything about. They have a vague idea that the organization is a powerful one, ruling as it does the immigrants from the flowery kingdom with a rod of iron, which dictates their business policy, sits in judgment upon those who dare disobey its orders, collects duty on the year after year, and which virtually holds thousands of them in bondage.

It is almost certain that not more than one man in a hundred can tell anything about this gigantic corporation, and has practically no knowledge of the powers it exercises among the Chinese in this country.

The six companies have been talked about a great deal since the passage of the exclusion act, many people have wondered why they have not been yielded such unquestioning obedience to its orders and allowed it to act as its representative in all dealings with the government. The matter may appear strange when it is known that the companies hold a mortgage on California, to the amount of 30 per cent of all the Chinese in the United States and Canada, and do not allow them to return to their homes until this mortgage is paid with interest. The six companies represent six divisions of the province of Canton, China, and their avowed aim is to care for the Chinaman coming from these districts, so that upon arrival here each immigrant may be associated with people who speak his dialect and come from the same province. The companies, care for the sick, furnish them with lawyers when they are accused of crime, and swear to protect them in every way. Their strongest claim, however, is upon the regard of their countrymen, by their guarantee to return to China the body, dead or alive, of every Chinaman who sails for these shores. They used to keep this promise to the letter, but now they only send home the bodies of those whose families request it.

The six companies started in a small way in 1850. They began through the operations of the American agents of a Hong Kong firm.

Their first work was hiring men in China to meet the demand for labor in California. As the number of Chinese firms went into it, and finally the agents of all these firms united for self-protection and in order to keep the business among themselves. There were six of these agencies and they were known as the Six Companies. Eighty per cent of the Chinese in the United States and Canada are brought here at the expense of the companies, which get them work or loan them money to start them in business. In return for all this they are bound by their guarantee to return money expended for them, and by an agreement which the companies have with the steamship lines, no Chinaman is allowed to return to his native land unless he can show a certificate to the effect that he is free from all indebtedness to the companies. Every Chinaman pays 2 1/2 per cent of his earnings to the company having him in charge, and if he is taken sick he is taken care of at the expense of the company, while, if he dies, they bury him, and if his parents require it ship his bones back to China.
