## REDONDO.

**Shipping Arrivals and Departures—News Matters.**

REDONDO BEACH, July 8.—The steamer Hermosa, Captain Derrfeld, from Avalon, came alongside Redondo wharf at 10 o'clock this morning, depositing 19 passengers from the islands, and got under way on her return to the same port at 11 o'clock a.m., taking out 65 passengers for Avalon.

Ten thousand sacks of grain (barley and corn) await shipment by the steamship Corona on her trip up, due tomorrow morning.

The Santa Fe people are making extensive additions to their track facilities at this point. A siding reaching from their station to the Redondo water works, fully a mile in length, and also a spur from the main track leading alongside Lindsey's planing mill, are among the additional tracks now being graded for.

Deep-sea fishermen Price, McDonald, Woolley & Edwards, Blackburn, Foot, Macey & Mathison landed large batches of rock bass, barracuda and halibut today. An aggregate of 2465 pounds was forwarded on the morning train of the Santa Fe to Los Angeles and Santa Monica.

Mr. Fred Parkis, traveling auditor of the Southern California railway, accompanied by Mrs. Parkis, were among the visitors at the beach today.

## SANTA ANA.

**The Crops in Orange County—Local Happenings.**

SANTA ANA, July 8.—The first carload of grain shipped out of this county for the season of 1893, left this city yesterday for San Francisco via Newport. It was the first consignment of an order of 15,000 sacks, which will be used in that city for brewing purposes, and for which 70 cents per 100 pounds was paid.

The barley fields are a busy place these days. Ten threshing outfits are at work in this county, and it will take them some time to handle the crop. The thresher of Mr. English yesterday did the heaviest day's work ever done by a threshing machine in this county—1625 sacks, averaging 118 pounds each, or 179,950 pounds were turned out in the day's run.

The Herald representative spent yesterday afternoon on the San Joaquin ranch, and was surprised at the rapidity with which the grain crop is being handled. From this 30,000-acre grain field an average of 20 sacks to the acre, or 600,000 sacks will be produced as against 90,000 sacks last season. This increase is largely due to the copious rains, but at least 100,000 sacks have been saved this season by the wholesale poisoning of squirrels last fall and winter.

All the grain farmers intend to commence a vigorous warfare against the common ground squirrels this fall, and a merry time will be had poisoning them.

Several grain buyers are in the county contracting for barley, and from 60 to 80 cents per cental is being paid for it, which is a satisfactory price to the growers.

The honey crop is nearly all gathered now, and will make 300 tons of strained sweet stuff this season. This is the largest honey crop ever produced here, and bee men are accordingly happy. From 4 to 6 cents per pound is being paid for it.

The sugar-beet crop will be a very fair
