

PARK MATTERS. A Monument to Be Erected to J. H. Tomlinson—Notes.

The park commissioners met yesterday at 10 o'clock in the city hall. Commissioners Rowan, Mesmer, Pinney and the superintendent of parks were present.

Mr. Pinney was appointed a committee of one to consult with the city engineer regarding the establishment of the grade and also to see about procuring a sufficient supply of water for irrigating purposes.

Mr. Mesmer was instructed to examine the condition of Chavez road where it enters the park.

It is the intention of the employees at the different parks to erect a handsome monument over the grave of the late superintendent, J. H. Tomlinson, in Evergreen cemetery. The committee, consisting of Messrs Mesmer, Le Grand, Howard and Garrison, reported that the necessary funds had been raised, and the monument would shortly be placed in position.

The superintendent of parks was authorized to cut all the flowers possible without disfiguring the different parts and also to furnish ornamental foliage plants to be used in decorating the city council chambers and mayor's office during the coming reception. He was instructed also to send messengers to the different localities in the city asking flowers for the same purpose. It is the intention to decorate the hall in the Kalakaua was entertained. All those desiring to send flowers should leave them at the mayor's office.
