SOME RATHER LAZY METHODS.

Commissioner Scott Has Omitted to Make Reports.

A General Ignorance of the Court House About Seal Bug Expenses.

The Law Calls for Monthly Reports to the Supervisors, Which Clerk Whittemore Says Have Not Been Filed.

There has been considerable inquiry of late with reference to the management of the county horticultural department.

This inquiry has grown up since the movements of the seal-bug lady bird, orna chalybeus, have assumed such importance to orchardists.

Last year, aroused by action by the necessity of making extraordinary efforts to keep the orchards clean, the board of supervisors made appropriations to provide the county with tents and fumigating apparatus.

Several thousand dollars were appropriated for this purpose, and the management of the business was left in the hands of County Commissioner Scott.

He had authority to compel any one to fumigate, and either do it with his own apparatus or the county's.

In the latter case the commissioner is supposed to charge the bare cost into the county of the labor and material in the fumigation of an orchard.

The manner in which this has been done may be and probably is all right, but the looseness with which the accounts are kept struck a Herald reporter day or two ago when endeavoring to get some inkling of the amounts which have been collected by the county commissioner.

Mr. Whittemore, clerk to the board of supervisors, was asked to show Mr. Scott's reports to the board showing the business of his office.

The reply was made that Mr. Scott had made no reports to the board. The act of the legislature covering the horticultural commission, as amended May 31, 1891, contains the following proviso:

"Sec. 8. It shall be the duty of the county board of horticultural commissioners to keep a record of their official doings, and to make a monthly report to the board of supervisors; and the board of supervisors may withhold warrant for salary of said members and inspectors thereof until such time as said report is made." (As amended 1889.)

Upon being asked whether or not the supervisors did not exercise a supervision over Mr. Scott's work in detail, Mr. Whittemore said that he did not believe there had been any regular reports from him.

He said that the money collected by the commissioner went into the county treasury, and an account of it could be ascertained at the county auditor's office.

A call at the county auditor's office was made and it was found that Mr. Scott was certainly on the books, but in rather a careless manner.

For some time after the commencement of county fumigation the money turned in by Mr. Scott was so turned in accompanied by the names of the persons from whom received.

However, the commissioner has been in the habit of turning in lump sums of money, without the names of the persons from whom collected.

Deputy Auditor Wood said that this had been the case, and while he did not think there was anything out of the way, it would be better for Mr. Scott to specify the persons from whom he collected the money, and hereafter he would, no doubt, be required to do so.

This was about as far as an investigation of the commissioner's office could be made until he was seen, and that was a matter of two or three days, because his office days are only Monday and Saturday, the remainder of the time being spent outside.

He is the most untrammeled officer, to say the least, that there is.

No doubt Mr. Scott is a very honest and conscientious officer, but there might be other incumbents where the laxity of accountability would prove dangerous.

Finally Mr. Scott was found and was very ready to exhibit his books and accounts. The system of bookkeeping as he said himself is very crude.

It consists of the entering into little pass books of the names of persons whose trees the orchardist fumigated, together with the amounts charged against them and the amounts paid.

From a running glance at their contents it was seen that the county paid about \$1400 for its fumigating apparatus last year. It collected from various orchardists about \$2500, and the accounts nearly balanced, although the first cost of the apparatus has not yet been obtained by the county.

There are quite a number of orchardists still in arrears for the fumigation, as they were allowed to pay in installments by the supervisors.

The percentage of cost per tree ranges from 18 cents to 80 and 90, and the average would probably be about 35 cents.

The charges making up this cost, as shown on Mr. Scott's book, are the cost of the fumigating apparatus, the cost of fumigation, the labor in doing the work, the cost of transporting the tents, etc., and 15 per cent added to cover the wear and tear and incidental expenses.

THE MIDWINTER FAIR. THROUGH A WINDOW.

A RIVERSIDE COUNTY COMMISSIONER ON THE MATTER. AN UNDERTAKER'S HORSE MEETS WITH SUDDEN DEATH.

He Considers that a Special Session of the Legislature is Indispensable—The Situation as He Sees It.

He Bolts Through a Show Window at Coulter's Store, Much to the Excitement of Many Bystanders.

A broken plate glass window and a large pool of blood, around which the flies swarmed in thousands, attracted a crowd of gazers outside Coulter's dry goods store yesterday.

About 9 o'clock in the morning Mr. Chase, of the undertaking firm of Chase & Co., was driving a hearse down Main street when the axle of one of the rear wheels broke and let one side of the wagon to the ground.

Mr. Chase was thrown off and badly bruised, but luckily sustained no serious injury. The horses, however, took fright and bolted away at a terrific speed, the broken wagon leaving fragments of splintered wood in every hole.

Reaching Second street, the animals turned and dashed up the road, the frightened pedestrians shattering on all sides. As they came into Spring street the bystanders saw that nothing could save them from going into the plate glass window of Coulter's store, and a general howl went up from every one as "stop 'em."

But it would have been easy to stop an avalanche. Right across the road the animals tore, and although one man did make a plucky attempt to check their course, he could not prevent one of the horses from going completely through the window.

Then followed a ghastly sight. The animal, cut and bleeding in a thousand places, endeavored to raise itself, but only stumbled and fell among the broken fragments of glass, inflicting fresh wounds.

Eventually the animal was taken out and removed to the nearest stable, but died within a short time.

The street for some time ran blood, and many anxious inquiries were made all day long at the police station as to what kind of a tragedy had occurred.
