THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

The anxiously awaited message of the president was transmitted to both houses of congress yesterday. No one is surprised that Mr. Cleveland has repeated in his message, but in more direct and argumentative terms than in his previous utterances, his firm conviction that the financial troubles of the country are due to the Sherman purchasing act, and that the immediate and unconditional repeal of that act will at once restore confidence and bring the business of the country back to its normal healthy condition.

Whilst Mr. Cleveland makes out as strong a case for unconditional repeal as it is possible to make, the friends of bi-metallicism will regret that he offers or suggests no proposition by which the American principle of recognizing both metals may be sustained in practice. He declares unequivocally that the United States cannot single-handedly restore the metals to a parity of value in the markets of the world.

We do not believe with Mr. Cleveland that the Sherman act has brought about all the ills under which we now suffer. Gold has gone from us in great quantities in the past year by the natural law of exchanges. The balance of trade, in spite of all the gauzy claims of the McKinleyites, has been against us, and that balance we have had to pay.

THE TIDE IS TURNING. It will doubtless be some time before we hear the last of weak banks in all all parts of the United States going to the wall, and of industrial institutions that have been overweighed by expansion and reckless expenditure closing down; but there is a system of adjustment and liquidation going on everywhere which will bring business down to a healthy basis.

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as to the action of congress on the tariff, and this content has been intensified by silly talk about repealing the Sherman silver-purchasing act. Except as an indication of the policy congress will pursue on the silver question, the repeal of the Sherman act is of little importance.

Another Deluge of Gold. When California and Australia were at the same time inundating the world with gold, the value of silver went up so far that the commercial nations were seriously thinking of lowering the ratio of the yellow metal, and many believed that gold would soon become a commodity, whilst silver would become the sole standard of values.

It was not till the wonderful Comstock was discovered, and the wide series of silver mines in Eastern Nevada, Idaho, Utah and Montana began to pour the white metal into the lap of commerce that any check was given to the upward tendency.

Now if this report of the wonderful deposits of the yellow metal is only partially true, here is a discovery that will soon more than offset any probable excess of silver that can be reached in the world's stock, and we may again bear of a movement to demote gold and establish silver as the sole money standard of value.

THE LEASE DISCONTINUED. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 8.—The directors of the Lehigh Valley Railroad company today voted to discontinue the lease to the Philadelphia and Reading railroad.

THE HUNGARIAN GRAIN CROP. BUDAPEST, Aug. 8.—Count Andreas Bethlen, Hungarian minister of agriculture, has issued a statement showing that there will be a decrease of about 500,000 hundred weight in the wheat yield, 4,000,000 in rye and 300,000 in barley, as compared with the yield of those cereals last year.
