SANTA MONICA.

The Swimming Contest Attracting A Large Attendance.
SANTA MONICA, Aug. 10.—The swimming contests to take place on north beach, in front of the bath house, the first of which will take place on Sunday next is already causing considerable excitement among swimmers in Southern California, who are entering their names.

The race is to be around a buoy a quarter of a mile from the start, making the course a half mile one.
The gold medal, which is a handsome one, will be displayed in some window in Los Angeles, which I will announce to HERALD readers later, and left there till it is won three times by some contestant, when it becomes his absolute property. No entrance fee will be charged, the race being a free for all. Entries received at the north beach bath house by mail or in person. The first contest will take place next Sunday at 2:30 o'clock, and each week the name of the winner of preceding heats will be posted with the medal.

The contract for the construction of a warehouse for the ones interest here has been let, and it is to be completed within 30 days. It will have a capacity of 10,000 sacks and placed in a convenient position for shipping over railroad.

The W. C. T. U. School of Methods Meeting.
LONG BEACH, Aug. 10.—The W. C. T. U. school of methods of Southern California was opened at 10 a. m. Wednesday with a promise meeting, led by Anna B. Southwick. About 100 members were present and readily responded to the leaders' invitations for Bible promises.

The regular work of the school was begun by taking up the topic, Evangelistic Work, and treating it under three heads:
1. The Devotional Hour in the Local Union, by Mrs. L. M. Stevens.
2. Gospel Temperance Meetings, by Miss G. I. Stuckney.
3. How to Organize a Local Union, by Mrs. Anna B. Southwick.

Mrs. Stevens said she thought "the devotional hour should bring us up from the mists of the earthly atmosphere to the clearer air of God's presence, whence we may descend, not to the valley of humiliation and defeat, but to the plain of every day battle and victory."
Mrs. Southwick seemed to be full of the true spirit of city mission work, and spoke with great feeling of the good the women could do in Los Angeles and other places.

devotional exercises were led by Mrs. Wright of Bakerfield.
Mrs. Mary C. Glass of Pasadena read an excellent paper on Narcotics. She gave the opinions of eminent scientists, physicians and divines on the subject, and said that to her mind the greatest evil resulting from the tobacco habit is the diseased body and mind of the tobacco smoker. A lively discussion followed the reading of the paper, and many suggestions were given and plans made for future work.
Loyal Temperance Legion work was discussed under the following heads:
1. How to Organize a Loyal Temperance Legion, by Mrs. Ida M. Russell.
2. How to Sustain the Interest, by Mrs. J. E. Terlingen.
3. How to Interest the Women in the Work, by Mrs. Celia Noll.

The papers were read in clear, full tones, and were listened to with great interest.
The discussion which followed the reading of these papers showed that the women of the Woman's Christian Temperance union believe that in the children of today lies their hope of success.
Mrs. D. Blackman, not being present, her paper on the How and Why of Press Work was read by Miss Reed of Pomona.
A talk to corresponding secretaries on how to do their work was given by Miss G. I. Stuckney.
An interesting paper, "The Woman's Appeal to the Women to Help in the Support of this Institution, whose doors are always open to friendless women."

RIVERSIDE.
District Fruit Associations Organizing—Local Notes.
RIVERSIDE, Aug. 10.—The work of organizing district associations under the rules of the Riverside Fruit exchange is progressing in a satisfactory manner, and ere long the entire acreage of this county will be represented. All orange growers realize the benefits to be derived from the advantages of a union of efforts which is bound to bring about results of great interest. The Riverside Height Growers' association has adopted a set of bylaws and also formed a contract that is to be signed by all members. At their last meeting Messrs. W. P. Sannes, R. W. A. Godfrey and J. Van de Grint were appointed a committee to interview the members in their district and secure their signatures to the contract. No definite action was taken in the location of a packing house. The majority of the members are in favor of purchasing a lot and building a packing house for the use of the association. The local association will probably elect delegates to represent them in Los Angeles at the convention to be held at the chamber of commerce rooms August 15th. The orange growers throughout Southern California have taken up the lead of those of this city and are forming unions, and will doubtless be represented at the Angel city.
