IS IT A CASE OF LETHARGY?

The Supervisors Appear to Ignore Horticulturists.

An Earnest Plea for Energy and Work Quietly Filled.

Horticulturists Protest Against the Fumigation Scheme and Protest Against Quiescent Methods About Purple Scale.

The board of supervisors met yesterday and held an uneventful session, passing upon a few routine matters.

A communication was received from E. H. Morgan, Thomas Meade, G. J. Dalton, G. J. Griffith and other horticulturists, with reference to the scale pests.

It was filed, the board taking no action upon it. The substance of the communication was as follows:

We, the undersigned, citizens and fruit growers of Los Angeles county, would respectfully petition your honorable body and request that a thorough investigation be made into the horticultural condition of the county to the end that the public may have a clear understanding in regard to the care and suppression of injurious insects and the supervision of the great fruit-growing interests of this county.

We understand that the worst of all existing pests, the purple scale, is now on several orange orchards in this county, and is steadily increasing in addition to other scales, and great apprehension is feared in consequence.

We earnestly urge in view of this and the heavy taxes the horticulturist interests are burdened in addition to the great expense of spraying and fumigating that the condition of precaceous parasites be inquired into, and if parasites now existing be found in sufficient numbers, arrangements be made whereby local authorities can work in harmony with the state board of horticulture for the best interests of all.

We are informed by Mr. Alexander Crow, state entomologist, that a black scale parasite imported by Professor Koebele has multiplied enormously in the orchard of Mr. Ellwood Cooper, at Santa Barbara, and has almost cleared that gentleman's orchard from that scale.

For these reasons and in view of the urgency of the case, we respectfully ask your honorable body to take such action in the premises as may be deemed proper.

FIRE MATTERS.

Proceedings at the Commission's Meeting Yesterday.

The fire commissioners held a short session yesterday morning, nothing but routine business being transacted. Mayor Rowan and Commissioners McLain and Wirsching were present.

E. J. Miles presented a communication stating that, owing to a mistake, he had deposited 40 tons of hay in the city corporation yard and offered to sell it to the city for \$7 a ton. Referred to the supply committee of the council.

The applications of A. J. Farra and John Hughes for appointments as callmen, were read and filed.

The pay-roll of the department for the present month, amounting to \$3580, was read and approved.

Engineer Lynch, who at the last meeting was cited to appear before the board, was reported sick, and on motion was given another week's time to appear before the board.

It was ordered that Chief Curran will be one of the judges of the new fire engine, No. 8, purchased from the W. C. Furry Co., and that he be requested to avoid having anything to do with its setting up or placing in order before its acceptance, but that the engine be put in thorough order by the Furry company.

Mr. Carter of the East Los Angeles chamber of commerce asked that, as the East Side paid its proportion of the tax, it deserved a fire department. He was instructed to write out the demands of the East Side chamber of commerce and present them to the board.
