ALL ABOUT AN ORGAN.

WHY REV. MR. CRABBE RESIGNED HIS CHARGE.

The Recent Controversy in the United Presbyterian Church of This City—Some Statements About the Affair.

Johnnie Morgan can play the organ to his heart's content and the other members of that far-famed musical family can also disturb the neighborhood if they choose, but a portion of the local Presbytery does not think that it is proper for the members of its church to follow gentle Johnnie's example, so have decided that the organ, like the heathen Chinese, must go.

While not coming out flat-footed for the deportation of the organ, they have recently taken action in regard to the United Presbyterian church that amounts to virtually the same thing. They have requested the pastor, Rev. H. W. Crabbe, to relinquish the charge of the church and this, too, in the face of protest after protest from the congregation, the majority of whom desire Mr. Crabbe to continue his work at the church and have repeatedly so stated.

The action of the presbytery, it is claimed, is due largely to the efforts of two of its members who have been opposed to Mr. Crabbe for some time past and have now obtained their object in his recent resignation.

Mr. Crabbe has had charge of the United Presbyterian church for nearly six years, but the difficulty with these members of the presbytery dates back about two years. As members of this body they are not attached to any church but worship at any of the churches of their denomination.

The first cause of the trouble, it is said, was due to a certain reverend gentleman who protested against the continuance of the use of the organ in service. He first went to Mr. Crabbe quietly to Mr. Crabbe and stated his objections. Mr. Crabbe replied that as the organ had been in the church since he had assumed charge, he had no authority to remove it. The brother, however, was not satisfied, and from then on was loud in his denunciation of the organ.

The next protest came from the fair sex. The wife of the other member of the presbytery stated that she did not favor voluntary singing by the choir. She affirmed that one of the laws of the United Presbyterian church provided that only psalms should be sung in worship by the congregation. No particular action was taken in regard to this latter protest, and from that time on the two reverends combined forces against Mr. Crabbe. A slight friction among some members of the congregation was the result, but no serious rupture has as yet occurred. The church has progressed favorably and thrived, but the ever restless spirit of discontent has been alert, and has at last accomplished the desire of a very small part of the congregation.

Under the nature of Mr. Crabbe's charge he is reappointed every year by the presbytery, and for the past several years he has been reappointed. For the ensuing year the minority accomplished their object by rendering a report unfavorable to the retention of Mr. Crabbe as pastor.

The meeting was attended by but a small part of the congregation. When the vote upon the pastorage question, it resulted in 14 for Mr. Crabbe and 17 votes against, this result being sent to the presbytery as the desire of the whole congregation. As the congregation numbers fully 30 active members, the rest, when the heard of this verdict, combined and signed a secondary petition numbering 60 names. The petition was sent to the presbytery and asked for a permanent settlement of Mr. Crabbe as pastor of the United Presbyterian church. This was denied by the Presbytery, and in the face of the fact that no remonstrance whatever from the balance of the congregation had been presented. The congregation not desiring to lose Mr. Crabbe, then presented another petition asking for a call leaving the name of the pastor vacant, but this was also denied.

Another meeting was held, at which the members of the church pledged sufficient money to pay the pastor's salary, independent of help from the board of home missions, and another meeting was held, and afterwards presented to the presbytery, asking that Mr. Crabbe be settled as pastor of the church. This third petition, although representing fully two-thirds of the members of the church, was denied. At all three meetings of the presbytery, when the various petitions were presented, the two brothers referred to above were present and conducted the opposition to Mr. Crabbe. They spoke at length against his retention and expressed themselves as strongly in favor of abolishing by the report of the annual vote of the congregation.

In view of the persistent refusals of the Presbytery to reappoint Mr. Crabbe

the members of the church have become resigned to the situation and have abandoned any further attempt to influence the Presbytery to reconsider its decision.

Mr. Crabbe delivered his farewell sermon before the United Presbyterian church congregation Sunday morning, and has resigned his charge.

Mr. Crabbe is a most estimable and able gentleman, and has done much towards building up the United Presbyterian church in this city. His resignation of the charge has been received with almost universal regret, and where ever he may be called he will be followed with the most kindly sentiments by all.

He was seen by a HERALD representative last evening and asked for some expression in regard to the affair, but declined positively to make any statement.

The firm yesterday put white men and youths at work, and it was stated by an arrival from Compton last evening that the new workers were doing the labor as well if not better than the Mongolians.
