



PASADENA. Nearly School Report—Thrup Institute Items—Notes. PASADENA, Sept. 13.—The yearly report of the condition of the public schools of Pasadena has just been issued in pamphlet form and makes interesting reading for those interested in our public schools.

This table shows a gratifying decrease in the average cost per pupil from \$31.37 in 1890 to \$26.36 in 1893, a reduction that will be appreciated by the tax-payers.

Hamilton, formerly of Garfield school, will take charge of the preparatory and mathematical departments, while Prof. W. K. Gaylord will look after the chemical department.

Miss Campbell, who conducts the sewing and dressmaking departments, arrived today from an extended eastern trip, while President Keyes is back again and hard at work after making a lecture tour of the southern part of the state.
