

THEY ARE ALL COMING WEST.

The Delegates Who Will Attend the Irrigation Congress.

Some Distinguished Representatives from Foreign Countries.

The Congress Will Be Convened Tomorrow—A List of the Delegates Who Will Be in Attendance.

Many of the delegates to the international irrigation congress, which will convene in the Grand opera house to-morrow, have arrived in the city.

FRANCE.

France will be represented by two prominent officials in the person of Leon Phillipe, director of agriculture and hydraulics, and M. Rene Lefebvre, inspector general of the French agricultural hydraulic commission.

RUSSIA.

The Russian government will be ably represented by Engineer Constantin Comodinsky, the eminent gentleman who represented that government at the world's fair.

MEXICO.

Mexico will send Señor José Ramon de Tbarra, a distinguished authority on matters pertaining to agricultural and irrigation matters as seen from a Mexican standpoint.

EQUADOR.

Ecuador will be represented by Juan J. Wright, consul at San Francisco. Beside these gentlemen from foreign countries others will be in attendance, but as yet the complete list is unobtainable.

THE STATES.

Nearly every state in the west will send a large number of delegates. Nebraska, Texas, Kansas and Montana send a particularly large number.

The smallest number of delegates is sent by Idaho, there being but two representatives from that territory.


