LIVELY LEGAL ROW RAISED.

Street Superintendent Watson to Be Sued. A Question as to the Defaulting Deputy's Bondsman.

Bondsman Donegan Claims That He Was Willing to Pay His Proportion of the Shortage.

The assertion was made yesterday by a city official that at tomorrow's session of the council a resolution would be introduced instructing the city attorney to commence suit against Street Superintendent Watson's bondsmen for the recovery of \$1300. The amount was embezzled by Arthur Stewart, Watson's former chief deputy.

Shortly after the shortage was discovered the city council instructed the street superintendent to at once make it up. Mr. Watson has so far failed to comply with the request, probably on account of affairs existing in connection with the bondsmen of the defaulting deputy.

J. Marion Brooks and D. F. Donegan, jointly, were Stewart's sureties. Upon these gentlemen Mr. Watson relied to get at least some assistance.

Mr. Donegan was willing, he said, to pay one-half of the shortage, and offered the amount to Mr. Watson, asking at the same time that he be released from further liability.

Mr. Donegan stated yesterday that he telegraphed Mr. Watson from Chicago, on hearing of the difficulty, that he would settle his part of the matter satisfactorily. "On my return," he said, "I offered to settle my half of Stewart's deficiency, providing I would be released from further liability. Mr. Watson refused to accept the proposition."

"I told him I didn't think he could legally collect even that much on the strength of the bond, but was perfectly willing to pay one-half of the shortage. I have been told the bond is worth nothing. I will fight the case to a finish."

It is said that Mr. Watson refused to accept a part of Mr. Brooks' payment of the shortage.

The attachment against Mr. Donegan was released yesterday, he having given bonds.
