NO NEWS ABOUT LANG WINSTON

The Missing Pasadena Not Found Yet.

Part of the Relief Party Return from the Mountains.

A Systematic Search Being Made—A Load of Supplies Taken to the Relief Party Last Night—Eleven Days Lost.

PASADENA, Nov. 27.—Two members of the relief party sent in search of Mr. L. C. Winston, who became separated from his party during a heavy snow storm 11 days ago, returned home this morning bringing, however, no definite news of the whereabouts of the lost man. The members who came back were Charles Wilson, brother of Lang and Jud Black, the latter in company with Mr. Newcomb being the first to go in the mountains after the return of Messrs. Reed and Brown. They came back by way of Switzer's camp, coming around that way with the hopes of finding Mr. Winston.

Mr. Black was interviewed by the Herald reporter shortly after his arrival in town.

He stated that the relief party is now located at Chilloo, about six miles from the camp which Mr. Winston wandered away from, which is 10 miles the other side of Barley flats.

A trail was found near where Mr. Winston and Brown separated, which was believed to have been made by the last man, and it was this trail which the two returning searchers took, but, as it proved, without success.

The trail was followed as far as Waterman ridge by them, but on account of the length of time which had elapsed since it was made, all traces were lost. The two, however, continued, coming out by way of Switzer's without finding any more traces of the lost man.

They report the rest of the party hard at work, making a systematic search of the mountains in the vicinity of Chilloo and Pine flats, which will be continued until something definite is learned.

Messrs. Black and Winston went back to the mountains tonight, loaded with provisions, and will stop as long as there is any hope of the missing man being found.

It is to be hoped that something definite may be learned one way or the other at once, as the suspense in something terrible for Mrs. Winston and other members of the family.
