

AFFAIRS IN THE FATHERLAND.

A Breezy Budget from the German Capital.

The Re-admission of the Jesuits the Event of the Week.

The Ratification of the New Commercial Treaties Assured—Attacks on Caprivi—The Kaiser Wants No Blabbing.

BERLIN, Dec. 2.—(Copyright, 1893, by the Associated Press.)—The vote in the reichstag in favor of re-admitting the Jesuits, is the sensation of the week, not only in Germany but throughout the Catholic world. In the Kulturkampf struggle Bismarck always poured his full vials of wrath upon the Jesuits and so earned for himself the opposition of the German Catholics. Since that time the pope and emperor have become reconciled. The position is much changed, though according to the calculations of the newspapers the bill ought to have been rejected. Their anticipations were falsified by the votes of indifferent members who believe there is nothing more to be feared from interference by the Vatican in political affairs. It would seem that the majority of the representative Germans have come to the conclusion that the policy of the Vatican is no longer that of interference in the political struggles of different parties at home and abroad, and should the Vatican at any future time have an influence in political affairs of Germany, by leaning towards the Franco-Russian entente, for instance, it is believed the representatives of Germany in the Reichstag would remain loyal to the fatherland, and such action upon the part of the Vatican would have no effect upon the Catholics of Germany, other than to cause them to discontinue the interference of the church in the political situation.

THE GOVERNMENT'S INTENTIONS. The government has not yet given any indication of its intentions in regard to the Jesuit motion, and although it is almost certain that no immediate effect will be given to the vote, the power to do so will remain in the hands of Chancellor von Caprivi, as a useful resolution, should he desire to attempt to bring about more cordial relations with the Vatican, with a view, possibly, of alienating the pope's partiality for France. Another inducement which might cause the government to accept the bill would be that it would do much to reduce the cleavage which manifested itself during the army bill debates between North and South Germany in the reichstag.

THE COMMERCIAL TREATIES. The committee to which the commercial treaties were referred last Saturday, today approved the Spanish treaty by a vote of 15 to 6. The majority was unexpectedly large, and ensures the adoption of the Spanish treaty. The treaty of the Roumanian commercial treaty is still doubtful. The motion by the Agrarian party that a treaty be concluded for three years only, was negatived by the committee having the treaties under consideration. The commercial treaty committee strongly advised the government to make a special concession to Cuba and Porto Rico on account of the American reciprocity treaty giving them advantages in iron and manufactured goods, and making German competition formidable. It is stated that the Polish party, departing from its previous declarations, has decided to vote in favor of the treaties, and as over one-half of the Centrists also support the treaties, it is believed the Roumanian commercial treaty will also be adopted.

ATTACKS ON CAPRIVI. The Agrarians do not abandon the hope of being able to undermine Von Caprivi's position and estrange him from the Emperor. The Kreuz Zeitung makes what is classed as a mean attack upon Caprivi for having, as it alleges, made himself the chief figure before the public in the internal machine affairs, by only incidentally mentioning the danger to which the Emperor was exposed. It is needless to say that the imputation is unfounded and will have no effect upon the emperor's mind. Rather than dispense with Caprivi the emperor would again dissolve the reichstag.

MUM IS THE WORD. The Cologne Gazette says the emperor has requested all the members of his suite conversant with the incidents attending Prince Bismarck's retirement from office, to maintain complete silence upon the subject, and neither utter false statements nor answer any attacks made upon them in connection with the retirement of the prince.

UNHAPPY BONDHOLDERS. The German bondholders of the Oregon Railway and Navigation company, of which the largest number of shares are held to be held in Germany, have called a meeting to take place at the offices of the Berlin bourse next Wednesday, to take measures to protect themselves on account of the non-payment of the December coupons, according to a report received. The Union Pacific which has managed this company, being in the hands of receivers, the latter now state they are not authorized to provide for the payment of the December coupons. This meeting is convened by the Deutsch bank, and there is considerable feeling among the German bondholders of Oregon Railway and Navigation, who claim their interests are seriously threatened by the attitude of the receivers.

AMUSEMENT FOR WORKMEN. A company has been organized to open a new Schiller theater, the object being to provide workmen with the best classical plays at the cheapest price. One mark will be the price charged for the best seats. Sondermann, Fuld, and Wildensbruck have joined the company. The emperor has taken quite an interest in the matter. He received Dr. Lowenfeld, leader of the movement, and promised to be a frequent visitor at the theater.

AN AFFLICTED QUEEN. The Berlin Post announces that the queen of Roumania shows symptoms of an attack of paralysis, which will be more severe than her previous attack. MARRIAGE REFORM. The minister of justice in the Hungarian diet today introduced a marriage reform bill.

THE SUGAR BOUNTY.

There Will Be a Severe Struggle Against Its Repeal. WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—There is every indication of a severe struggle in the senate over the sugar schedule of the Wilson bill, if not modified in the house. A prominent southern senator said today that the senators from all the states which produce sugar, including those from the best sugar producing states of the west, such as Nebraska, Kansas and California, would unite to oppose the change in the bill. The plan of a graduated reduction in the bounty, he said, would result in killing the sugar producers by inches. The sugar men, he added, were never in favor of the bounty plan, but preferred an impost duty. They would not, he said, ask for protection in the sense understood by McKinley, but would be content with a revenue duty of, say, 1 1/2 cents per pound on raw sugar and 1 1/2 on sugars refined above 14 Dutch standard. From the foundation of the government till the present bounty law went into effect, sugar had been recognized as an article from which revenue could legitimately be derived, and one which would be more evenly distributed than any other. It was, he asserted, folly for the government, with its revenues running low, to cut off the \$88,000,000 revenue, which it obtained the last year from foreign sugar taxes. Many thousand people would be deprived of a means of livelihood in Louisiana alone by the Wilson measure.

HELD FOR EXTRADITION.

A California Burglar and Murderer Arrested in Chicago. CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Charles Brown, alias John Wilson, Frisco Slim and Boston Slim, has been arrested by Chicago detectives and will be held to await requisition by the governor of California. On the night of January 20, 1892, Brown, disturbed by a night watchman while cracking a safe at Rio Vista, killed the watchman and escaped. Sheriff Henderson of Solano county sent out a description and Brown was recognized here by the central station detectives by his peculiar upper lip and two teeth missing. The sheriff at Fairfield, Cal., has been notified.

TRANSCONTINENTAL RATES.

Agents of Western Roads in Conference in Chicago. CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Lomax of the Union Pacific and Whitney of the Great Northern arrived in Chicago today, and will hold a private meeting to see if the transcontinental rate trouble cannot be patched up. No representative of the Northern Pacific will be present, and the Canadian Pacific has refused to participate in the conference. Other lines will do what they can to adjust matters. The east-bound lines today met the Erie's reduction of the grain rate to 20 cents to New York. A cut in provision rates is confidently anticipated.

A FATAL SPEE.

Two Boys Filled with Whisky and Frozen to Death. STERLING, Dec. 2.—William Stauffer, Addison John and Marcus John came to town to spend Thanksgiving. On the way home Stauffer treated the two John boys to whisky, and all got full. Stauffer was afraid to take the boys home, so put them in a blacksmith shop to sober up. The next morning he informed their parents, who went after them and found Addison frozen to death and Marcus unconscious and like to die. Stauffer was arrested for furnishing liquor to minors and placed under bonds to the next term of court.

UNION PACIFIC AFFAIRS.

Receiver Anderson Going West to Look After Government Interests. NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—E. Ellery Anderson, one of the receivers of the Union Pacific, will probably leave for the west tomorrow to look over the affairs of the road. S. H. H. Clark, the president, is en route to New York from Omaha, and Oliver W. Mink has arrived from Boston. Anderson said good talent was engaged on important work connected with the proposed plan of adjusting the Union Pacific debt to the government and the matter would be completed as soon as possible.

Failed Twice. NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—A. H. King & Co., clothiers, have failed again. Liabilities, \$100,000; assets, \$105,000, mostly consisting of stock on hand. The firm failed last May, owing about \$300,000, and compromised at the rate of 40 cents, paying part in notes. These are now falling due and the firm cannot meet them.

Attempted Train-Wrecking. NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 2.—A dastardly attempt was made last night to wreck a passenger train on the Nashville division of the Louisville & Nashville near Napton. The engineer noticed on the track telegraph poles and other obstructions and stopped the engine in time to prevent a wreck.

The Iron Hall Receivership. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 2.—In the Iron Hall receivership case, Judge Winters this morning rendered a decision making permanent the receivership and ordering a distribution of the funds of the order.

Brooklyn Burglars. NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Burglars entered the hardware store of O. Burnett, Brooklyn, and among other plunder got \$60,729 in stocks and mortgages and \$20 cash.

Carpet Mills Resume. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 2.—The extensive carpet mills at Kensington are resuming operations on full time, and claim the prospects for the future is good.

Proctor Sworn In. WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—John R. Proctor, the new civil service commissioner, was sworn in and entered upon the duties of his office this afternoon.

A WOMAN'S CHARGE.

Mrs. Jennie O'Neil Alleges Extortion and Blackmail. A Curious Phenomenon.

A singular and interesting phenomenon was observed on Echo mountain Thanksgiving day. Standing on the veranda of the chalet, which affords such a magnificent outlook over the valley, the visitors observed a brush fire somewhere in the vicinity of Rivera. A large column of whitish-gray smoke ascended, and on reaching a certain level in the air spread out in all directions, so that it speedily had the appearance of a vast living mushroom, growing larger and larger every moment, until at last it had a top at least a mile in diameter. The sun shone brilliantly on it, and it was a most singular sight. In the center, just over the ascending column, the hot air and smoke forced up the horizontal layer of smoke, so that it was exactly as if a mushroom were crowned with a dome-like protuberance in its center. After appearing thus for half an hour or so, the meteorological conditions which preserved the smoke layer in its relative position to the ascending column of smoke were changed, and in a few minutes nothing special was to be seen but the drifting cloud of smoke from a brush fire.

A Chess Champion.

On Saturday next Mr. L. Lipschutz, the champion chess player of America, will play 12 simultaneous blindfold games at the Athletic club chess rooms. This is the first time any chess player of prominence has visited Los Angeles for some considerable period, and it is expected that the Athletic club rooms will be taxed to their utmost capacity. The champion of America has, up to the present time, lost one or three games during his visit to this city.


