

with his accustomed promptness he went to work to attend to it. Today and tomorrow he will meet with the Southern California managers and directors of the midwinter fair and will familiarize himself with the plans and during the few weeks remaining before the opening of the fair will devote his energies and experience to gathering an exhibit that will adequately represent this section, and properly advertise it and keep up the good impression that Southern California made at the Chicago exhibit.

St. Louis, Dec. 3.—A special to the Republic from Mobile says: The Dauphin Island railroad has used the Pall Mall Gazette for \$400,000. The suit is the outgrowth of statements contained in the Gazette reflecting on the stability and the honesty of parties interested in building the road. Many English capitalists are interested, and the publications in the Gazette, it is alleged, have hindered the sale of the bonds, thus scaring off foreign capital invested.
