A TRIO OF MURDERERS.

A CAPTURE IN CHICAGO THAT RECALLS ONE IN LOS ANGELES.

The Arrest of 'Frisco Slim Winds Up the Gang—How Miles Bowler Took in Leo Horrell, One of the Murderers.

The announcement in the Associated Press dispatches from Chicago yesterday of the capture there of 'Frisco or Boston Slim, charged with the murder of night watchman Howard at the Southern Pacific station at Rio Vista, near Sacramento, recalls the clever capture of one of the murderers, Leo Horrell, in Los Angeles by Deputy Sheriff Miles Bowler in April, 1892.

The capture of Slim winds up the trio of murderers. "Specs," one of the men, was captured at the time and turned state's evidence. He is now at large in some part of the country. Leo Horrell, who was captured by Detective Bowler, then on the police force, is now serving a life sentence at San Quentin, and "Slim" has kept out of the way ever since until his capture Saturday in Chicago.

On the 20th of January, 1892, at 1:30 o'clock in the morning, the night watchman of the Southern Pacific at Rio Vista station, Howard, was shot and killed by safe-robbers. The burglars were at work in the station and were surprised by Howard while engaged in blowing open the safe. The watchman ordered the thieves to throw up their hands, but was made the target of a volley of pistol shots. He was hit by one of the bullets and died from the wound. A reward of \$400 for the capture of the cracksmen was offered.

The officers north came to the conclusion that Leo Horrell, alias Bob Powell, and John Williams, alias Frisco Slim, and Boston Slim, were the men who committed the crime, and a description of the two men was sent out broadcast.

Sometimes after a local deputy sheriff captured a man who resembled one of the safe-crackers, but later on it was discovered that the case was one of mistaken identity. Detective Bowler, while walking along Spring street, near a trio of young fellows near First street. They looked like strangers in the city, and he approached them to take a better look at them. One of them had been here before, and knew the officer. He therefore readily answered the searching questions put to him, while one of his companions seemed rather uneasy. Bowler therefore became suspicious, and was fairly overwhelmed, when, under the glare of an electric light, he discovered the remarkable resemblance of one of the three to the photograph of Leo Horrell, the picture on file in the rogues' gallery. The suspect was at once arrested, and at the police station was subjected to a careful examination.

The physical description of the man wanted was found to fit the prisoner perfectly. Another important point in the circular issued was that Horrell carried a silver watch bearing the initials "L. H." and a double chain. On the prisoner's person, within the lining of his waistcoat, was found a silver watch with the engraved letters "R. L. H." as well as a double chain such as described.

When first arrested the prisoner persistently denied that he was Leo Horrell, or that he had ever heard of the case. He declared that he was born in Sacramento, and that his name was Ray L. Harris.

After the arrest a number of detectives compared the prisoner's marks with the description given, and in every instance were convinced of the identity of the captured man with Leo Horrell. The prisoner still denied knowing anything about the case. He acknowledged finally, however, that he had been in trouble in Napa county for petit larceny. Detective Bowler asked him whether he knew any of the Napa delegation of the Native Sons, and he replied he did. Then they went out to find some of the delegates. He had not succeeded, when he took Detective George Insley to the city jail to look at his man. Insley agreed with Will Smith and others that the identification was perfect, and the confidence he expressed seemed to weaken the prisoner. The fact was noticed by the officers, and after the interview was over, Detective Bowler returned to the cell, and prevailed upon the alleged Harris to confess that he was really Horrell.

POLICE COMMISSIONERSHIP. The Council Expected to Fill the Vacancy Today.

The question of the appointment of a police commissioner by the city council to fill the vacancy in the board comes up today.

During the latter days of last week the probable action of the council was discussed, but not very generally.

The members of the council who were approached by reporters professed ignorance upon the subject, and were even loath to mention the name of any one being considered for the vacancy.

An air of mystery was given to the situation by this coyness on the part of the city's statesmen, which they showed little disposition to clear up.

Under the law the political status of the commission is fixed. The vacancy is to be filled by a Republican. What

dark and mysterious object lessons the Republicans have in contemplation have been very well concealed.

It was learned yesterday, however, that some of the members of the council have settled upon George L. Arnold, the Machiavel of local Republican statesmen, as their choice for the vacancy.

There is great pulling and hauling over the attitude which the prospective commissioner will have toward the retention of Chief Glass as the head of the department, and it is supposed George Arnold is pat upon the proposition of holding the big chief just where he is.

There are some Republicans who are not at all backward about criticizing the manner in which the chief allowed eight of his men to be amnestied and dismissed from the force, among them some of his best men, without rising to the dignity of a protest against it; and this, it is said, has something to do with the way some councilmen look at the question.

In the meantime the Democratic members of the council are looking on with considerable amusement at the anxiety of their Republican confederates, and are taking very little part in the contest.

Quite a lively time is anticipated when the subject of the appointment comes up. It is the general impression that one will be made today, but what complications will arise before the final decision it is somewhat difficult to foresee.

The action of the council was a subject of very great interest in the police department yesterday, and little else was talked about between members of the force.

A. Freeman, a kind-hearted, motherly lady, who saw that she was clothed properly and fed and then secured for a good place, where she will have a home, as well as getting the reward for her capture.

Marchant, who swore to the warrant against her on the ground of unaccounted money, came down on Saturday on the train, and after finding that she was comfortably located left for Los Angeles.

Miss Perkins is undoubtedly of sound mind, a well-appearing young lady of 22 years, brunette, and conducts herself in a ladylike manner. She was evidently seen the hard side of life, and from relatives at that.

Laura Perkins, when found by a Herald reporter at the company of Mr. J. K. Kneasel, in Santa Monica, appeared to be not only in her right mind, but was cheerful and apparently as happy as could be expected of any young woman. She said she left the home of her aunt, Mrs. Richardson, because she was entirely dissatisfied with her circumstances there when she was treated like a servant, getting in return only her living.

The only reason she gave for leaving home on the sudden impulse was because her aunt spoke to her harshly. When she left she did not know where she would go, but kept on walking until she reached Santa Monica, stating positively she knew no one there. But


