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THE BOY IDENTIFIES AGUILAR.

Said He Saw That Person Near His Wife's House.

Alexander Ortega Connects Aguilar With the Wife Murder.

The Officers at Sea Over the Conflicting Evidence—He Will Probably Never Be Convicted.

The authorities have been busily engaged in their endeavors to secure evidence against Aguilar, who is accused of having so cruelly murdered his wife.

Alexander Ortega, the 10-year-old boy who stated that he saw Aguilar near the house at the hour the poor woman was burned, was taken to the jail to identify him. Aguilar was put in a crowd with a half dozen Mexicans but the boy picked him out in an instant as the man he saw hitch his buggy near the Silvas houses the day the girl was burned.

Every attempt possible was made to shake the boy's statements, but he stuck to his story with so much persistency that the officers were greatly puzzled.

It is almost certain that there was no fire in the yard the day Mrs. Aguilar was injured. It is equally certain that some one burned the girl. Whether Aguilar did it remains to be seen.

It must be a hard matter, but the boy's statement and Mrs. Aguilar's dying declaration have some weight. Regarding the statements of certain Anaheim parties, it is found that their stories conflict. Some say that Aguilar was blowing at 12 o'clock on the day of the burning, and some say that they know where he ate lunch. Some say that he was hauling wheat.

It does not remain for Aguilar to prove his innocence, but the prosecution must make a jury believe him guilty.

This will be a hard matter, and although it is generally believed that he knows more than he will tell, he must go free if the authorities cannot find some tangible evidence against him.

They are as yet at sea, and it is pretty safe to presume that whoever did commit the fiendish act will not pay the penalty.

IN THE LAW'S HANDS. Police Court Cases Disposed of Yesterday.

Judge Austin had a light run of police court cases yesterday.

The most important case was one in the justice court. It was the case of Angie Rennis, who was charged by Rosina Smith of keeping a house of ill-fame. The parties are colored and are evidently revenging themselves upon each other. The case was said to be of juicy sensationalism but prolific of much attention from morbid curiosity seekers. Angie Rennis could not offset the preponderance of evidence against her and was fined \$50.

C. P. Hall, John Allen, G. Davis and Christina Neagle were convicted of vagrancy, but sentence was suspended in each instance.

The case of J. C. Goldborough, on a misdemeanor charge, was set for the 18th.

Justice Seaman will decide the case of S. Maier for selling venison on next Tuesday. Mr. Maier admits selling the meat, but said that it came from Texas. The question to be decided is, does the law cover such sale or only prohibit the killing and sale of deer meat in this state.
