A Pressing Want. EDITORS HERALD:—Without harping too much on a topic, which from time to time has been ably urged by the Herald, I would like to ask why can we not have some drives?

With a city of the fairest promise, unrivaled almost in the United States, a city replete with charming homes, business blocks, unending railway facilities, miles of paved streets and a commercial future almost dazzling, we have to admit that we have not a complete drive or boulevard worthy of the name.

Like the creation of our "big hotel," we hear many promises, but it is almost impossible to stimulate interest to the point of immediate action.

Without attempting to note all needs of this nature, look at the highways south of the city, viz., Central avenue, New Main and Figueroa street.

It is believed that the facts thus set forth will prove of interest to the public, as well as the special student, showing as they do the average and extreme conditions of the more important meteorological elements and the range within which such variations may be expected to keep during any corresponding month.

TEMPERATURE. Mean or normal temperature, 53 deg. The warmest January was that of 1892, with an average of 57 deg.

The coldest January was that of 1890, with an average of 49 deg. The highest temperature during any January was 82 deg., on January 30, 1883.

The lowest temperature during any January was 30 deg., on January 29, 1880.

PRECIPITATION (RAIN AND MELTED SNOW). Average for this month for 15 years, 2.97 inches; number of days on which .01 inch or more of precipitation fell, 6; greatest monthly precipitation, 7.83 inches in 1890; least monthly precipitation, .20 inches in 1887.

CLOUDS AND WEATHER. Average number of cloudless days, 17; partly cloudy days, 8; cloudy days, 6.

PREVAILING DIRECTION OF WIND, NORTH-EAST; highest velocity during any January was 48 miles on January 8, 1882.

Some Views on Churches. EDITORS HERALD:—I have received a letter from an officer of the Salvation army requesting me, as minister of the Church of the New Era, to ask my congregation to contribute something towards a Christmas dinner for the poor.

Our New Era views on the subject of the increasing poverty and misery attending our "Christian civilization," and the manner in which society should deal with the subject compel me to decline compliance with said request.

The benevolent and humane purposes and feelings prompting the so-called "charities" of our abnormal social system will be recognized by every generous mind.

We are glad to see that elements exist, and the New Era people are as ready as others to respond to the pleadings of hunger and want.

But we hold that the "charity" method of dealing with the poverty question is not only a hopeless failure but a positive detriment to the society and the true interests of those whose welfare is sought in the bestowment of these "charities."

We hold that the present social and religious theory of "charity soup" for this world and "salvation by proxy" for the next is erroneous and stands seriously in the way of a true civilization.

Accordingly the Church of the New Era is taking steps to organize some co-operative industries and also to provide an emergency fund, for the two-fold purpose of relieving the immediate wants of the unfortunate and rendering the only true aid to the unemployed.

That is, helping them to help themselves. Charity, in the spurious sense of almsgiving, has no place in the vocabulary of the Church of the New Era.
