MADE HIS FAREWELL DRAW.

A Man Who Won and Lost Fortunes in a Day.

Death of I. S. Scentt, a Long Beach Recluse.

A Once Multi-Millionaire Found Dead in a Lonely Cabin Under Very Peculiar Circumstances. His Latter Days.

If "Billy" Hurt, the notorious gambler who is known from east to west, could read the history of a man found dead yesterday in a lonely cabin near Long Beach, he would meditate and say: "My autobiography, though full of terrible tales of gambling and swindling, is not in it with that man's."

And yet little is known of the recluse whose body was found under peculiar circumstances. Enough is known, however, to justify the statement that I. S. Scentt has made and lost millions almost in a day.

Coroner Cates received word that Scentt had been found dead in his cabin on Alamitos beach. He went down and found that the man had died from pneumonia.

Scentt had a checkered career. Seven or eight years ago Paris was the scene of a great gambling craze, which was of short duration. Scentt who was a native of Spain, and a man 60 years of age, created more excitement in gaming circles at the time than did "Billy" Hunt. During his short stay in Paris he managed to make several millions of dollars through cards and other gambling devices known only in Paris and at Monte Carlo. He lost his gains as easily as he won them.

Becoming disgusted with the life, he sailed for New York with quite a snug sum. Several years passed over his head, and he was without anything save the valuable jewels and trinkets which he always carried with him.

Misfortune having overtaken him, as it eventually does every man of his kind, Scentt came to California.

When he settled in the little cabin by the sea he decided to live in obscurity. His life as a hermit did not last long.

Scentt avoided meeting people whenever possible. He lived from the sale of his trinkets and sold them at a great reduction from their value. He was little known around Long Beach.
