AN OLD MEXICAN'S DEATH

MARCELLO CHAVEZ SUDDENLY EXPIRED IN JAIL.

The Peculiar Facts Revealed by an Autopsy—Verdict That He Had Died a Natural Death.

Marcello Chavez, a Mexican apparently 60 years of age, was found dead in the city prison yesterday morning.

Chavez was taken to the receiving hospital last Monday and treated by the police surgeon. He was thought to be crazy, and was booked on a charge of insanity.

At any rate he appeared violently ill. It was a hard matter to keep him in bed. He would jump up and act as though he was mentally deranged.

He appeared somewhat better Tuesday, and ate a hearty dinner. He was given a bunk in the jail, but failed to respond to the call yesterday and Jailer Collins found him dead.

Coroner Gates held an inquest on the body at Garret & Sampson's, at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Police Surgeon Bryant testified to finding an autopsy, which revealed the fact that Chavez died from congestion of the lungs. He was old and broken down.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict to that effect. Nothing is known of Chavez, and no one inquired for him at the police station.

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The Midwinter Fair Wine Exhibit—The Banquet Committee.

At a meeting of the Los Angeles county wine committee of the Southern California midwinter fair association yesterday a large wine bottle, 28 feet high, was adopted as the feature for the wine exhibit from this county.

The frame of this mammoth bottle will be covered with over 1000 bottles of the different wines manufactured in this county, and will be an imposing and suggestive exhibit.

A design suggested by Mr. J. F. Crank, jr., was very favorably considered and much admired. It was an exhibit of wines in bottles, covering a house and showing what a beautiful effect might be secured by the blending of the different light and dark wines.

Had it been the plan to keep open the exhibit at night, the wine house, with an electric light inside, would have been a striking feature.

The banquet committee of the chamber of commerce met yesterday afternoon. There were present Messrs. Klokke, Severance, Latham, Cline, Willard.

The date was established subject to possible change for February 10th. The exact location is not yet determined, although the probability is that it will go to some outside city.

DAGGETT BURGLARS.

A Long Beach Detective Gets in His Work. Detective Dell Cox, well known in Long Beach, returned from San Bernardino recently after delivering several offenders over to justice.

On Saturday, the 17th inst., the store of J. B. Myers at Daggett, Cal., was burglarized, it was alleged, by Thomas Kelly and Bert Austin, who escaped to the hills with their plunder.

The alleged robbers were taken to San Bernardino, where they pled guilty. Kelly was given three years and Austin two years and eleven months in the penitentiary.


