EUGENE T. BAKER'S SERVICES RECOGNIZED BY YALE.

A Tablet Put in the Trophy Room of the College Gymnasium in His Honor.

One is reminded that unobtrusive virtue is sometimes not its only reward by the following clipping from an eastern paper:

"A tablet has just been placed in the trophy room at the Yale gymnasium. It is of bronze, about two and one-half feet in length and one and a half in breadth, and is mounted on a heavy oak slab. The following is the inscription:

In recognition of the Services of Eugene T. Baker '77, The Organizer and Captain of Yale's First Victorious Football Team.

"This room has been furnished and the tablet placed here by his classmates 1893.

In this day of hero worship, when periodicals are clamoring for the utterances of the putative father of American football, it is relieving to note so graceful a recognition of its true paternity in the man who impressed intercollegiate football with its first real life, taught Walter Camp to play the game and made possible the practical application of Deland's scientific theories and the brilliant feats in the field of Hefelfinger, McChing and other men.
