The Prince and Princess of Wales to Go Visiting

INFLUENZA ON THE WANE

A Budget of Gossip from the Domain of Great Britain

Interesting Point in Regard to the Inter-Collegiate Boat Race—The Row Over Lady Eden's Picture

LONDON, March 30.—With the Prince of Wales' return from the Riviera, the announcement is made that the Princess of Wales is going to Copenhagen next week to visit her parents, the King and Queen of Denmark.

The Prince of Wales' set much regret is expressed at the fact that the gale of Thursday last did much damage in the grounds of Sandringham Palace, the residence of the Prince.

BISMARCK'S BIRTHDAY

Refusal of the Reichstag to Celebrate It Causes Comment

BERLIN, March 30.—The refusal of the majority of the reichstag to celebrate Prince Bismarck's birthday, Emperor William's bitter comment thereon and the scenes which occurred at Friedrichshuhe during the past week, have put Germans in a feverish condition and public opinion is much more generally outspoken than is customary.

The Conservatives and National Liberal press vigorously denounces the reichstag majority, one paper in Leipzig going to the extent of saying that they "ought to be buried like so much carrion."

So far as the spontaneous utterances of popular feeling are concerned, the vast majority of the German people certainly disapprove of the reichstag's decision. A significant sign of this fact is that throughout the week, whenever the emperor appeared publicly, he was the recipient of popular ovations.

On the other hand the Centrists, Radicals and Socialists have taken the emperor to task in unequivocal language for his telegram to Prince Bismarck and because of sundry passages in his address at Friedrichshuhe.

The Cologne Volks Zeitung, the chief organ of the Center party, in a series of prominent articles criticizes the emperor sharply, saying that while it is the emperor's right to change his mind or conduct towards Prince Bismarck, it could not be disputed that it was the right of the reichstag majority and the Centrists especially to adhere steadfastly to their old opinions.

Herr Richter's organ, the Freisinnige Zeitung, pointedly compares the relations between the Emperor and Prince Bismarck and those which existed between them a couple of years ago, and asks whether the reichstag has gone as far in refusing to share in the present celebrations as the monarch did in 1892, when he forbade all recognition of Prince Bismarck and the friends of the latter were officially ostracized.

The Vossische Zeitung speaks in similar terms of the Emperor's attitude and denies that he has the right to thus insult the reichstag in defiance of constitutional government.

A SNOW AND WIND STORM

Sweeps Over Colorado and Does Great Damage

MERCURY FELL SUDDENLY

Denver Visited by the Worst Gale in Many Years

The Storm Extended Over Several Cities and Reached as Far as Nebraska. Stock in Danger

DENVER, March 30.—The snow and wind storm continued all day with unabated fury. It is the worst storm since the memorable one of March, 1891, which continued for three days.

At 5:20 the wind was blowing at the rate of forty-eight miles an hour, but it slowly decreased up to noon when it registered thirty-four miles.

A cable of the Columbine school house was blown out. Stones weighing thirty-five pounds were blown over thirty feet, while heavy bricks lay piled up over eighty feet from the building.

The tramway and cable companies are having great difficulty in moving their cars and many of the street railway lines are blocked.

At 8 p. m. the snow was about a foot deep in this city and it is badly drifted. During the early part of the day trains on the railroads east and west were run.

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The storm is rapidly advancing southward, and tomorrow the indications are that it will reach the Gulf States with a touch of it.

CASTLE ROCK, Col., March 30.—The worst snow and wind storm of the season has prevailed here since an early hour this morning. It is blowing at a terrific rate and snow is drifting badly and should the storm continue as at present it will impede railway travel.

LEADVILLE, Col., March 30.—The weather is very blustery and cold at this place. The snow has been blowing in clouds all the day.

OMAHA, Neb., March 30.—A great snowstorm is raging in Northwestern Nebraska. Snowflakes have been seen from here. Five inches fell today.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 30.—Vincenzo Dipelmi, a window cleaner by occupation, shot and instantly killed Eugeni Diledi in a house at 408 Broadway shortly after 5 o'clock this afternoon.

The murder is the outcome of a feud which has existed for some months past between the two men. The victim is alleged to have been frequently heard to threaten Dipelmi's life.
